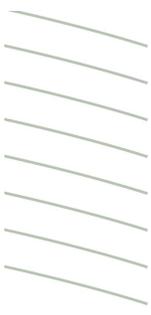

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# *The Challenges of Two Libraries*



My role as Librarian at St Athanasius College involves working between two libraries at our campuses in Donvale and Eporo Tower, La Trobe St, Melbourne CBD. I work a twenty-hour week, mostly at the Donvale Campus as it has the space and unobtrusiveness to be a “work” place, so the covering and labelling of print books is confined to that library as is everything involving paperwork. The Eporo Campus Library is small, highly visible and unsuited to my level of messiness, and the Library desk is often used by others for study because it has the best spot on the College floor, so it’s problematic to leave anything lying around. We have a small collection of around 5,500 monographs and journals spread across the two campuses.

When I was first given the opportunity to look at plans for our College’s second campus and library, I was excited at the prospect of designing a new library space. Little did I realise at the time that the space was very small and quite restricted in its possibilities. Nevertheless, I was able to mock-up what I believed to be a useful combination of private and group study and sitting areas, and I passed these ideas on to the designer for the whole floor. Unfortunately, many of my suggestions were overlooked but the end result is still quite pleasing.

The Bishop had already included a compactus (mobile shelving) in the new library specifications, and wanted the type that was used in St Vladimir’s Seminary in the U.S., the full electronic version. I was able to find the company



that imports the same working parts from the U.S. and then builds their own framework. My contact at Dexion was fantastic and walked me through the whole process. Unfortunately, he left before the compactus was installed and we never finalised the idea of installing a locking mechanism on the bays to secure the more valuable books. The compactus works well for the level of demand at the Library. I don't think it would suit most library environments as it's really a one-person-at-a-time solution for a small space.

In preparing for the additional campus, I introduced RFID tagging to the library to enable a self-borrowing kiosk to be installed at the new site, knowing there would not always be a librarian available. I researched the products on offer and interviewed four librarians about their experiences with the two major players in the field. I decided to move forward with FE Technologies because the hardware seemed to differ very little across the two companies, but I found FE Technologies' customer service far superior and that was important to me as a non-technical person. Their product has been reliable to date and the kiosk is very easy to use. Tagging was onerous but not overwhelming, particularly as we have a small collection and I had some help to break up the routine. I did envisage installing security gates at the new library, but this proved unviable as the door is set against a wall on one side so there is no room for gates. With the site often unattended, no one is around to notice an alarm in any case.

Plans for use of the two campuses were not articulated in advance and questions such as, "Will I get a car space?" were never answered. As it turns out, I don't have a car space and usually pay to park across the road in a city carpark when I need to bring in or take out books. I bought a Clax cart to transport large numbers of books. This is a foldable trolley with folding crates, very easy to collapse and lift into the car boot.

Each semester the evenings when there are classes at Eporo change, so I have to be flexible regarding my availability. I have the help of a volunteer so to date I have needed to be at Eporo only one night a week. I prepare for the upcoming semester by checking holdings at each library for the units being taught and ensuring all relevant books are in the correct place. I change the shelving location for each item on the LMS and put an Eporo Campus sticker on books as required. This has been helpful when books are returned to the other library. There are sometimes issues when assignments are due as I can't always move everything that might be useful. This is an ongoing problem, but fortunately the wealth of online resources we have access to now through the University of Divinity can usually offset any deficiencies in print offerings.

We have very few students taking face-to-face classes at Donvale so the library there is rarely used by students, although academic staff make good use of our print resources. The predominance of students studying online has made my role easier as I focus more on providing online materials where available. Print book purchasing is generally restricted to specialised research areas pertaining to early Christianity and monasticism in Egypt, and Orthodox studies, except where insufficient online resources are available for teaching units.

Five years ago, overseeing the two libraries as a half-time librarian would have been extremely difficult, possibly unviable due to the need to move books around, but with the increase in online study and resource availability, the demands on me have reduced significantly, to the point where, effectively, the College has one active library and a storage/workspace facility.




Fig 2: Donvale Campus Library



# *ANZTLA and the ALIA Professional Development Scheme: a survey*



## *Introduction*

At the 31st ANZTLA Conference in Canberra in 2016, several presentations were held at the National Library of Australia. In Judy Brooker's presentation, ALIA's Director of Learning highlighted the benefits of ALIA's Professional Development (PD) Scheme.<sup>1</sup> This scheme is open to all Associate (Librarian) or Library Technician members of ALIA.

Subject specialisations were introduced by ALIA as an extension to its PD Scheme. Members can demonstrate their specialised knowledge by focusing their learning and PD activities on subject-related competencies. Each specialisation has a minimum of eight competencies. The subject specialisations that existed at the time of the Canberra conference included: Research/Academic, Health, Public Library, Schools, and Government. In 2017 two new specialisations were added: Data Specialisation, and the Vocational Education and Training (VET) Library Specialisation. Data had previously been a stream in the Research/Academic Specialisation. In 2018 another two new



specialisations were announced: the LIS Practitioner Research Specialisation, and the Indigenous Engagement Specialisation, bringing the total number of specialisations to ten. Each of these has its own subject-specific competencies, although there are some areas of overlap. The Research/Academic Specialisation is based on competencies which address the unique opportunities and challenges within the research and tertiary education sectors. This is the specialisation that is currently of most relevance to theological librarians. There are three streams: general, research, and academic libraries (teaching and learning).

After Judy's presentation the question of whether a "Theology" Specialisation might be useful for ANZTLA members was discussed by several attendees. It may be that "theological librarianship" already aligns well with the Research/Academic specialisation. Alternatively, it may be that there are some unique competencies that are distinctive to theological librarianship. Before pursuing these questions any further we wanted to determine how many people within the ANZTLA community were also members of ALIA and/or ALIA's PD Scheme.


## The Survey

A short, four-question survey was distributed via the ANZTLA-forum on 8 August 2016 in order to gather the required information. The survey questions were prepared using Survey Monkey. Participants were also invited to contribute additional comments related to professional development in the theological library environment. By 24 August 2016 there had been a total of 41 survey responses received. These are detailed below.

### Question 1 - Are you eligible for professional membership of the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA)? If required see:






One respondent that was currently ineligible for professional membership of ALIA indicated that they were studying and would be eligible upon completion. They currently had student membership with ALIA.

**Question 2 - Are you a current member of ALIA?**



### Question 3 - Are you a current member of ALIA's Professional Development Scheme?

One respondent indicated that they were not a current member of ALIA's PD scheme but that they had registered with the PD tracking tool so that they could become a member when they completed their study.

Another respondent that was eligible for Library Technician membership of ALIA said that they had a Bachelor of Library Technology and were currently studying to upgrade to Librarian status. They noted, "Not that it will make a difference job wise, it just allows me to have the title I am operating at". They were a current member of ALIA and of ALIA's PD Scheme. Although already a member of the PD Scheme they commented that they need to activate this so the learning activities they engage in will be accredited towards certification.

Another respondent that was eligible for Associate (Librarian) membership of ALIA but not a current member of ALIA or ALIA's PD Scheme commented that "Like many librarians in Australia, the reason I am not a member of ALIA is the membership fee which neither I nor my Library can justify paying." The cost of membership was mentioned by several respondents. One noted that "Our College used to be an Institutional Member back when it was useful for getting ILL vouchers to pay




for ILLs. The \$ cost of membership to the Individual Librarian seems quite high. I perceive that it is not particularly relevant to theological Libraries and Librarians, but maybe if there was a sub-group I would join and go to meetings.” They were eligible for Associate (Librarian) membership of ALIA but were not a current member of ALIA or ALIA’s PD Scheme.

One respondent indicated that they had been a member of the ALIA PD Scheme since 2003. Others suggested that time management issues and needing to prioritise PD may be factors for those who had not yet joined ALIA or its PD scheme. Responses included comments such as, “I need to get around to joining.” Another respondent that wasn’t currently a member of the ALIA PD Scheme indicated that they planned to join since receiving information at the ANZTLA conference.

**Question 4 - Do you have any particular comments that you would like to make about professional development in the theological library environment?**


Nineteen responses were received to this question. All are detailed below, although some have been slightly edited to ensure anonymity.

1. I am working in an academic environment, so consider that the Research/Academic specialisation works well for me.
2. I’m not aware of any PD happening.
3. There may be some additional competencies that it would be good to identify that relate specifically to work in a theological library. The theological library world is generally a much smaller and less resourced environment compared to larger university libraries, and this requires some additional skills.
4. It definitely requires subject knowledge e.g. church denominations, figures in church history, theological terms etc.
5. More PD is needed in our sector. It is quite isolated, especially in one-person libraries so more opportunities tailored to our sector would be good. Probably a lot of University sector PD would be applicable but, then again, maybe not because University sector PD would assume a large University budget which Theological Colleges do not have. It would be a challenge to present things which were relevant to the sector but affordable.
6. I find the ANZTLA conferences to be most valuable for professional development, although I do attend local ALIA events where relevant, and also staff development sessions offered by local University (available to us as an affiliated body).
7. I’ve been in the general track for years (majoring on Academic activities), the cpd email suggestions are excellent, the scheme is definitely worthwhile but I think a Theology track may



not be sufficiently distinctive and also may contribute to us being a bit 'inbred'. Being forced to look at academic library developments in general is good discipline as it shows us "what is possible" not "what is available cheaply/ we can afford."

8. A theology specialisation is very useful for ANZTLA members resulting in dissemination of knowledge for those in the subject area. Research/Academic specialisation is a broad umbrella. Focus on theology specialisation is more helpful for the practitioners in this field and a more profitable use of time at conferences.
9. It should be made a priority. We need to develop transferable skills to enable us to work in other types of libraries, and not just theological ones. This will make us more employable.
10. It could be a useful tool to suggest commitment to our particular field. I don't know how much work would be involved for ANZTLA, though.
11. Many theological librarians work either alone or in libraries with few staff, so informal training from more experienced librarians, or librarians with a different experience, is often limited. There is often little or no technical support or training.
12. Attending ANZTLA annual conference is one huge professional development injection. I don't attend many ALIA PD seminars/workshops due to the cost factor and lack of time
13. Theological libraries are wide ranging - from large university to small. The 'in-between' space is difficult for the small & medium to do what the large are able - staff, budget, expertise. This is why ANZTLA is such a valuable source of information sharing and support. To have even more support via ALIA would be very positive.
14. It would be useful to identify key components that are unique to theological libraries to assist professionals who are new to the environment, particularly those who work alone, to ensure they develop all necessary skills and knowledge.
15. I think PD in the theological area overlaps the academic area somewhat as most will operate in a tertiary environment, involves users and producing learning resources, cataloguing, digitising, information retrieval etc. The subject area is narrower than many tertiary institutions; I think that would be the main difference.
16. I was inspired by someone's talk years ago to keep a record of professional development but I just can't find the time these days.
17. Cost would play a big part in considering greater involvement.
18. I would be interested in seeing a 'theological specialization' in the PD scheme.
19. Could aim for 5-10 standards that people in a theological library need to know to perform the job



## Challenges, Questions and Conclusions

This survey reveals that only about half of the ANZTLA members surveyed are also members of ALIA (51.22%). Even less are members of the ALIA PD Scheme (29.27%). Comments from respondents suggest that there are a number of factors that influence these membership decisions. These include the cost, perceived lack of time, and a view that the benefits of membership would not be as relevant to their own library environment.

The comments about professional development in the theological library environment were wide ranging. A number expressed an interest in having a theological specialisation in the ALIA PD Scheme but others felt that the broader Research/Academic library specialisation was very relevant and would assist librarians to develop transferable skills that would make theological librarians more employable in the wider sector and lead to them being less “inbred”. While PD relevant to librarians working in the academic sector would generally be relevant to theological librarians, university libraries tend to have larger PD budgets, while smaller theological libraries may not have a PD budget at all. This makes some relevant PD activities inaccessible. Another area of concern was the isolation of some theological librarians who may work alone and therefore have little opportunity to learn on-the-job from a more experienced colleague. In a solo librarian environment, librarians may not be able to attend PD activities because it would leave their libraries unattended.

The role of professional development for theological librarians may be an issue that ANZTLA wishes to engage with more in the future. Opening up this conversation and undertaking further research in this area could lead to a range of possible outcomes. ANZTLA may like to consider reviewing the current list of competencies for the specialisations included in the current ALIA PD Scheme. This would help to determine whether they adequately address the requirements of those working in the theological library environment. However, even if a new “theological specialisation” and corresponding list of competencies was created within the ALIA PD Scheme, it would not be of benefit to a large number of theological librarians who are not currently members of the scheme. However, continuing professional development is vital if ANZTLA members are to maintain their skills and keep up-to-date with developments in the theological education, and broader higher education sectors. ANZTLA may wish to address some of the barriers or challenges that currently limit the ability of individual members to engage in PD activities.

Anecdotal evidence suggests that it is also becoming increasingly difficult to recruit good quality librarians who also have a theological background. While it is not necessary for a theological librarian



to have a theological qualification to be employed, having such a qualification is certainly an advantage. This has led librarians at the University of Divinity to propose recently that newly appointed librarians with limited or no theological background be able to undertake theological studies as part of their employment contract. This proposal has yet to be approved but it does provide just one example of how a need for more theological knowledge on the part of new employees might be met.

Further research could also be undertaken to investigate the value that theological librarians place on their own professional development. This may be influenced by perceptions held more generally about the profession of librarians. Institutional support for professional development of library staff may also be determined by whether librarians are regarded as professionals in their own right, or merely as support workers within the broader academic environment. It is unfortunate that “librarians often seem to fall in the “blind spot” for academics and theological educators rather than being identified and valued for the significant role they play as part of the theological education team.”<sup>2</sup> ANZTLA may wish to take a more active role in advocating for the value of continuing professional development for members of its association. ALIA has also recently announced 2020 Pathways<sup>3</sup>, a new means to gain formal recognition for commitment to ongoing professional development. This may assist members to be recognised as the professionals that they are. This, in turn, may facilitate theological librarians being allocated appropriate PD time and being adequately funded by their employers for PD activities.

If ANZTLA does take a more active role in supporting the ongoing learning of its members, it will need to determine the best way to do this. How it answers some of the following questions will help to decide the best path forward. Should support for professional development be done within the ALIA framework, a similar but separate scheme within ANZTLA, or some other alternative? Could ANZTLA take a more active role in promoting appropriate PD activities, and also provide a means for members to record and reflect on these activities? Would ANZTLA be interested in providing a way to recognise this commitment to ongoing professional development, and how would it do this? Historically, ANZTLA established its own organisation that was separate from the national library associations of Australia and New Zealand. Other specialist groups, such as health librarians, have remained under the umbrella of ALIA. Would the time ever come when ANZTLA would consider a similar arrangement, and work more closely with ALIA? Rather than ALIA, would ANZTLA be better off partnering with Atla, particularly with Atla’s recent rebranding and its more international focus. At the 29<sup>th</sup> ANZTLA Conference held in Melbourne in 2014, the Executive Director of ATLA



at the time, Brenda Bailey-Hainer spoke of opportunities for professional collaboration and development. She noted that as a professional membership organisation Atla “creates continuing education and PD opportunities for its members, including an annual conference, online webinars, and support for regional workshops”.<sup>4</sup> Whatever direction ANZTLA ultimately takes, the future of professional development for theological librarians in Australia and New Zealand will continue to involve ANZTLA members collaborating regionally, nationally, and internationally, with like-minded organisations that share a common purpose.



# Launch of Mannix Library's Special Collections Room

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On Friday 15<sup>th</sup> February 2019, a gathering was held in Mannix Library (<http://www.mannix.org.au/>) in East Melbourne to celebrate the launch of the library's new Special Collections Room. The well-attended event was also an opportunity for library staff to demonstrate the library's newly installed ElarScan A2 scanner, as well as a new website, created to showcase the library's Archbishop Goold Special Collection.

For the past two years, Mannix Library staff have been involved with a project funded by the Australian Research Council titled *A Baroque Archbishop in Colonial Australia: James Alipius Goold, 1812-1886*. Goold was Melbourne's first Catholic Archbishop and made a significant contribution to colonial Melbourne, amassing significant collections of artworks and books, and commissioning the construction of St Patrick's Cathedral. Contributions by Mannix Library staff to the Goold project to date have included: several talks and conference presentations, including at the Goold Symposium in February 2018; research into and curation of an



exhibition of Goold books at Catholic Theological College; the creation of a website to showcase Goold's library (<https://gooldlibrary.omeka.net/>); writing articles for the project's blog; co-authorship of a chapter on Goold's library in a forthcoming book, *The Invention of Melbourne: A Baroque Archbishop and a Gothic Architect*; and preparation for an exhibition of the same name being held at the Old Treasury Building in Melbourne from 31 July 2019—January 2020.

Archbishop Goold amassed a significant personal library during the course of his lifetime and on his death his books were left to the diocesan library. Over the years this collection of books was variously dispersed and largely forgotten. In fact, prior to the project, staff at Mannix Library had no way of knowing whether any items in its collection had previously belonged to Goold, as no information indicating Goold provenance had ever been included in library catalogue records. However, more than a thousand discrete volumes with Goold provenance have now been identified at Mannix Library and a new Special Collection created of these items. Some Goold books are also located at the Melbourne Diocesan Historical Commission in East Melbourne, and items from both collections are gradually being catalogued, digitised and added to the Goold Library website.

Digitisation of items from the Goold collection is being facilitated by the installation of a new Elarscan A2 scanner. This purchase was funded by the University of Divinity in support of a new target in the Library Resources goal of the University's Strategic Plan. Over the past few years, Mannix Library has focussed on the development of its special collections. The library has sought to use digitization as a means to better showcase these materials and to improve access to them by researchers. The library's old technology, while suitable for scanning general documents, was not appropriate for use with rare and fragile materials. In addition, the new scanner has made it possible to digitize much larger items which wouldn't have been possible before. It has been possible to scan a variety of different types of items, from rare books to antiquarian coins. One of the favourite features of the scanner has been perspective correction, which enables users to scan tightly bound older books, only needing to open them to 90 degrees. Library staff are also pleased that the scanner has inbuilt OCR functionality and look forward to making more use of this feature. Although located in the Mannix Library, the scanner will facilitate a range of University-wide digitisation projects. Over the course of 2019, Mannix Library staff will develop several strategic digitisation projects with the intention of showcasing other special collections held across the University. Collections will be accessible via the University's Library Hub (<https://library.divinity.edu.au/>) which is managed by Mannix Library on behalf of all members of the University. The aim is to enhance the accessibility of these collections and to promote their future research potential.

As well as housing both the new scanner and items from the Gould Collection, the new Special Collections Room will also display and showcase other rare and unique resources that are held by Mannix Library. These include the antiquities and coin collections formerly owned by former lecturer Br Rod Doyle CFC, and the Rare Books Collection (including pre-1800 works and incunabula). The *Corpus Christianorum* collection includes critical editions of predominantly Latin and Greek texts by Christian authors from late antiquity until the end of the Middle Ages. A multi-volume set of Jacques-Paul Migne's *Patrologia Latina* and *Patrologia Graeca*, published in the mid-late 1800s is also located in the new room as well as a more current collection of Catholic Theological College Staff Publications.




The new Special Collections Room is also home to four historically significant bookcases which enhance the beauty and formal ambience of the room. These large timber bookcases were originally located in the library at Raheen, an Italianate mansion in Kew built in the 1870s. Raheen was the official residence of several Archbishops of Melbourne from 1917–1981, most notably Archbishop Daniel Mannix, after whom the Mannix library is named. Subsequent owners of Raheen, the Pratt family, donated the bookcases to the Archdiocese of Melbourne in 1986. Prior to their relocation to Mannix Library they had been housed at Corpus Christi College, initially in Clayton and then in Carlton. Because of their size, relocating the bookcases was a major logistical exercise. After they were moved into the Mannix Library,

repair and restoration work was undertaken to help return the bookcases to their former glory. These magnificent pieces of furniture can now be appreciated by all who visit the library.



At the launch, Mannix Library manager, Kerrie Burn noted that she wished to embrace a broad understanding of what it means to be “special”. This is the reason that the new room is called the Special Collections Room rather than the Goold or the Rare Books Room. She also spoke about the chain of events that led to the construction of the room in a space formerly dedicated to the housing of the library’s journal collection. The launch was also a time to offer thanks to all who had contributed to the project, which was a real team effort spanning many months.

It is hoped that the new Special Collections Room will itself be a resource for both library users and all those associated with both Catholic Theological College and the wider University of Divinity. It is able to be used by all staff and students, booked for meetings or presentations, and will be particularly useful for researchers wishing to access items from any of the library’s Special Collections.



# *Mannix Library Moves to a New Library Services Platform*

In late 2018, Mannix Library signed an agreement with OCLC and the transition to a new library services platform began in earnest. Implementation of OCLC's WorldShare Management Services (WMS) occurred over the summer break, with a go live date set for February 2019, prior to the commencement of first semester. After more than twenty years using the previous system, and over a year spent investigating various options, the library team is now very happy to have moved to a system that has already provided many benefits for both library staff and library users.

Mannix Library is a member library of the University of Divinity (<https://divinity.edu.au/>), a collegiate university that was founded in 1910. All students and staff join the University through one of its eleven Colleges. Based in the Australian cities of Melbourne, Adelaide and Sydney, each College is a unique learning community. The Colleges are supported by a wide range of churches and religious orders that together resource the University as a whole. Through scholarship, the University aims to address the issues of the contemporary world

through critical engagement with Christian theological traditions. Mannix Library's primary role is to serve the needs of staff and students of Catholic Theological College. However, it also welcomes staff and students from the wider University of Divinity community and members of the general public. The Library also manages the University's Online Library Hub (<http://library.divinity.edu.au/>), which provides access to online resources for all members of the University.

For those who may not be too familiar with OCLC, their website states,

OCLC, a global library cooperative, supports thousands of libraries in making information more accessible and more useful to people around the world. We provide shared technology services, original research and community programs that help libraries meet the ever-evolving needs of their users, institutions and communities.

OCLC's WMS system is built around OCLC's WorldCat, the world's most comprehensive global network of data about library collections and services. The new system offers many advantages for Mannix Library staff including workflow efficiencies, streamlined cataloguing processes, and additional functionality not available in the old library system. Using a system based on internationally-shared library data allows staff to re-use standard bibliographic, serial, vendor and other data. Mannix Library's WorldCat Discovery interface



(<https://mannix.on.worldcat.org/discovery>) was familiar to many library users as it has the same look and feel as the University's current combined library catalogue, known as UDCat (<https://divinity.on.worldcat.org/discovery>). The library has chosen to embed the Discovery interface search bar into its new Mannix Library website (<http://www.mannix.org.au/>).


The multiple libraries that are associated with the University of Divinity use a variety of different Library Management Systems but they achieve a unified presence because of the integration of their current systems with the OCLC WorldCat Discovery interface that underpins UDCat. The University of Divinity Library Hub (<http://library.divinity.edu.au/>) also uses another OCLC product (EZproxy) to authenticate users, and provide remote access to online resources. Using the same company for UDCat, authentication, and Mannix Library's new library platform allows for more streamlined integration between the different systems. Enhanced functionality and interoperability between the various systems and products were significant factors in the decision to move to a new library system.

WMS is a cloud-based library services platform that offers all of the usual applications needed to manage a library. The system is very standards compliant which ensures that cataloguing data is of the highest quality. OCLC also integrates fully with Libraries Australia, the resources sharing service managed by the National Library of Australia, which also provides the data that underpins Trove (<https://trove.nla.gov.au/>). When Mannix Library adds holdings directly to WorldCat, OCLC's nightly automated process for synchronizing WorldCat holdings with Libraries Australia ensures that our Libraries Australia records are always up-to-date, without the need for any extra intervention by cataloguing staff. This frees up staff time to work on other projects such as the development and promotion of our unique resources and special collections. There were several other reasons for the library's decision to move to WorldShare Management Services:

- System upgrades, ongoing support and training on new releases are all included in the annual subscription. There are no additional costs to ensure we have access to the system's latest features and functionality.
- Founded over 50 years ago, OCLC is a globally-recognised company which also has office and support staff conveniently located in Melbourne. The OCLC implementation team worked co-operatively with us on an accelerated implementation plan to ensure our system was operational prior to the start of first semester 2019.

- 
- The American Theological Library Association (now known as Atla) offers a consortium discount for Atla member libraries that wish to use OCLC WMS. This is the only arrangement that Atla currently has with a Library Services Platform vendor.
  - 
  - OCLC's WMS system is used by a growing number of libraries around the world including National Libraries (e.g. Canada and New Zealand), as well as many other University, College and Research Libraries.

Mannix Library staff were unanimous in their decision to move to the new library services platform and, despite the challenges of a tight implementation schedule, have been pleased with the enhanced functionality and other benefits that have resulted from their move to OCLC WorldShare Management Services.



# NSW Chapter Report 2018

## February Meeting – Christ College, Burwood


Discussion topics – We discussed the conference theme and ‘Boundless’ was chosen as one which was broad enough to encompass a variety of topics. A graphic designer was engaged to design the logo and the chapter members voted for the current design. Numerous names were suggested as the keynote speaker. The idea of inviting speakers from other faiths was discussed, and although Muslim and Jewish speakers were invited, none responded to our invitation.

Notable library reports – Mount St Benedict library started a street library program; SMBC is preparing for an online postgraduate course; Campion College is working towards self-accreditation.

## May Meeting – Campion College, Old Toongabbie

Discussion topics – A conference planning committee was beginning to form itself, with several volunteers. We had invited the State Librarian, John Vallance, to be the keynote speaker and he was considering this. We discussed possible options for the conference dinner as Robert Menzies College is a dry college and ANZTLA members enjoy a drink.

Notable library reports – Catholic Institute of Sydney Library was transitioning from using UNILINC to Ex Libris, and had instituted a ‘Friends of the Library’ group; Morling College Library has just implemented Open Athens and is planning their new library building; Excelsia College Library was developing library support for a new business course; Catholic Education Centre Bathurst has undertaken a cataloguing project for their special collections.



## August Meeting – Moore College, Newton

Discussion topics – Highlights of the Brisbane conference were shared by those members who attended – the keynote speaker Maria Stanton and the session on Evidence-based Librarianship were particularly appreciated. The conference committee for the Sydney conference was finalized (Erin Mollenhauer, Kim Robinson, Kate Scott and Gabrielle Fury), and an interim list of speakers was shared. A call for volunteers to look after the scholarship recipients was issued. Julie Olston (Manager, Moore College Library) suggested targeting the scholarship invitation to Papua New Guinea, since there are numerous theological libraries there.

Notable library reports – Mary Andrews College library has been weeding and re-cataloguing their collection to better suit the students; Moore College Library is considering different consortia options for online resources, and looking at different packages in order to reduce staff time managing the databases and serials; Broken Bay Institute Library is working on their Blackboard platform for online courses.

## November Meeting – Mary Andrews College, Sydney

Discussion topics – The ANZTLA board approved the suggestion to invite theological librarians from PNG to apply for a scholarship to attend the conference. Invitations for sponsorship were sent out with little response at this time. The library tours for the Friday afternoon, of the State Library, Caroline Simpson Library and Moore College Library were finalized.

Jacqui Buckland was nominated Treasurer and Keziah van Aardt offered to continue in the role of Secretary, in the absence of any nominations.

Notable library reports – SMBC Library and Campion College Library are both trying to manage lack of space; Broken Bay Institute Library has just joined the Libraries Australia Document Delivery program; Mount St Benedict Library has moved to Glebe and greatly reduced their collection; Moore College Library was planning to move their database from an on-site server to a software-as-a-service platform with SirsiDynix, and had received a Community Heritage Grant from the National Library for conservation projects.

Special thanks go to outgoing Treasurer Kate Scott and Secretary Keziah van Aardt, who have served the NSW Chapter well for several years. Thanks also to the libraries who have hosted our meetings.



# SA Chapter Report 2018

Meetings were held in February, May, August and November at different libraries within Adelaide. It has been usual practice to hold the Annual General Meeting at the February meeting, but attendance was low for the meetings during the year, so the AGM was deferred until the November meeting.

- Barbara Cooper stepped down from the position of Chair of the ANZTLA SA Chapter, held since 2015, and Trevor Schaefer volunteered to replace her. Barbara has been acting Secretary during the year and volunteered to continue in this role.
- Ana Grieve has been arranging some initial visits to choose a venue for the 2020 ANZTLA Conference.
- Katrina Dal Lago, previously at Tabor College Library, continues to work on the ANZTLA Archives, which are currently stored at Bible College SA.

The following libraries submitted reports throughout the year:


## *Adelaide Theological Library*

The library was relocated successfully and opened on 12 February.

A strategic vision was planned to enable the library to better serve the students and faculty, particularly in the context of online communication. Over 50% of students live outside the metropolitan area. Library planning days took place in October, with priorities drawn up and work commencing on a Vision Statement.

A library page was added to the Adelaide College of Divinity website and an Adelaide Theological Library website was launched in July. The library computers have been upgraded / added to the Uniting Church Synod server.

A marketing plan to gain more patrons is to be launched.



A Graduate Diploma in Information Studies student completed a 3 week full time placement which was very beneficial for both parties.

Ana Grieve attended the COPHE Library Seminar in Sydney in October.

### Australian House of Prayer for All Nations

A pallet containing audio / video tapes and books was sent to PNG. This process was affected by the earthquake, but the shipment is now underway.

Pauline Redman (Resource Room Coordinator) reported that loans are in the process of being transferred from a Borrowing book to their database, which will facilitate loans' administration greatly.

A site at a motel on Kangaroo Island is being developed with a plan to install a café/library/research centre, following the island's Internet connection upgrade.

### Burrow Library, Bible College of South Australia


A stocktake was completed at the start of the year, being the first for many years.

Orientation for new students included a checklist to ensure that they have accessed student email; Moodle; self-circulation process and accessed journals at the start of the semester.

A long-term project of relabelling our main collection is underway with help from our volunteers, who attend on a casual basis.

The journal collection in the compactus is being evaluated and weeded by Assistant Librarian, Lauren Hull. This also is a long term project, which will continue for many months.

Barbara Cooper (Librarian) attended the Liberty National User Conference in Melbourne in August.



## Löhe Memorial Library, Australian Lutheran College

A new server with 2 library system upgrades and implementation of the acquisitions module occurred before the start of the academic year. Shaun Lancaster is participating in a committee working towards an upgrade of the ALC website. Sara Altmann completed acquisitions training in January. Lavinia Gent undertook training in the Libraries Australia Document Delivery system in April. Access to LADD has resulted in a substantial increase in interlibrary loans.

Library guides to promote user experience in the following areas were posted to the library web: Martin Luther's writings; using ebooks; photocopying, scanning, printing; rare books; classification systems; ALC teaching staff / emeriti publications. Plans continue to add to these guides over the next few years.

Collection maintenance continues with redundant items being disposed of via book sales, donations to Oxfam and paper recyclers.

To commemorate the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation, the full set of hand-coloured images from the Löhe Memorial Library's 1551 edition of the Luther Bible has been prepared as a digital resource available for study by scholars and interested Lutherans around the world. Images are available for view via the library website :

The University of Divinity agreed to add The Dead Sea Scrolls Electronic Library – Biblical Texts to the collection of databases.

The acquisition of an online English translation of Luther's Works was approved, which will benefit the wider community as well as ALC staff and students.

The Friends of the State Library of SA enjoyed a tour of the Löhe Memorial Library and Rare Books Collection in September, which was conducted by Trevor Schaefer.



## St Barnabas College Library

Matthew Anstey resigned as College Principal in late 2017 and Don Owers has been Acting Principal during the recruitment process.


Student numbers are encouraging, with a significant cohort of Honours students, some of whom are considering higher degree studies.

8 library volunteers have assisted in the cataloguing of around another 6,000 books this year. This brings the collection to around 14,000 items with lending functions for over 100 registered borrowers, including college students, lecturers, staff, the College Council, church office staff, and all ordained South Australian clergy. It is hoped to expand lending rights to see the library functioning as a public facility.

Sadly Ros Devenish, the college librarian, resigned at the end of 2018 in order to be closer to family in Victoria. Her outstanding work has established the college library for St Barnabas, from the generous gifting of around 70,000 books/items donated by Mr Clive Rodger. Ros' contribution to ANZTLA SA during her time in Adelaide has been greatly valued and we shall miss her at our meetings. We were able to farewell her at our end-of-year lunch in November.

## Tabor College Library

Many changes occurred at Tabor due to redundancy and restructure, with the library really feeling the impact. 4 library staff members have left, including librarian Katrina Dal Lago, 2 assistants, and library manager, Oksana Felistova. Helen Gorzowski, acting library manager, and Helen Ponting, assistant, have covered desk shifts during this time. A new library manager, Anne Hall, commenced in December, and we look forward to welcoming her to our ANZTLA meetings in the New Year.



# VIC Chapter Report 2018

The Victorian Chapter gathered for three meetings during 2018.

The March meeting was held at St Paschal Library in Box Hill. It included a presentation from Miranda Fyfield and Huw Sandaver about their attendance at the Rare Books Summer School Cataloguing Course held at the State Library of Victoria. Miranda's paper on the event appears in *The ANZTLA EJournal* #20 (2018).


Huw provided an insight into the Goold project at Mannix Library. Cataloguing of books and other items has been time consuming due to the work involved in tracing the provenance of each book, and in recording any signatures. Signatures are binder's notations used in the absence of pagination. As an example, Huw showed us a hymn book published in Florence in 1706, prepared by the choir master of the Duomo, which contains signatures and cancelled pages. The latter are pages carefully cut out of all copies of an 'edition' of a book. Apparently, this was done in preference to the labour intensive work of changing the printing blocks used to print the book.

The August meeting was hosted by St Athanasius College, Eporo Tower Campus in central Melbourne. The final meeting of the year was held at Good Neighbours Café in Balwyn and provided a social gathering with delicious lunch to finish off the year.

Site reports for member libraries are presented below...

## Dalton McCaughey Library

New Chief Librarian at DML, Charlotte Clements, started on 12 February, along with new library dog, Rufus Clements. Rufus has spent a few days at the library and is settling in well. It seems a library dog is expected and, he is (mostly), happy to oblige.



The DML team is investigating a new library system. The preferred system, Koha, will save on system costs, provide more usability for reporting and collection management and provide an improved search experience for library members.

DML are also seeking a new staff member to take over from Ria when she retires.

### Alphacrucis College, Melbourne Campus Library


Harvest Bible College no longer exists. As of Dec 1 2017, we are the Melbourne Campus of Alphacrucis College (AC). AC is the denominational college of Australian Christian Churches (formerly AOG) but we have students from many different denominations. AC's spread of subjects is much wider than Harvest's used to be but the Melbourne campus (and library) will continue to focus on Theology and Ministry for the time being.

In mid-2017, Harvest packed up its QLD collection and shipped it to VIC for sorting & redistribution. That sorting has finally been completed and approx. 1,500 items were selected to stay in the VIC collection. The remaining 14,500 titles will most likely be shipped to the Adelaide campus library of AC. The process has allowed for a lot of catalogue correction and tidying – merging duplicate records, linking authority headings, correcting typos, downloading z39.50 records and adding contents of titles to enhance the level of cataloguing for the Melbourne collection.

Work on the library project of adding tables of contents to catalogue records continues and is progressing very well. At times it is proving difficult to help students understand we are running 2 libraries – 2 catalogues, 2 sets of (different) databases, 2 ways of requesting items etc – but we are getting there. [The Melb Campus library catalogue & databases are not yet integrated into a single Alphacrucis library catalogue; we are operating as 2 separate libraries within the one College]. The possibility of a new, combined-all-campus library catalogue is being looked into but we are still at the early stages of investigation.

### Leon Morris Library, Ridley College

We had our highest yet numbers of students studying online in Semester 3 (November 2017-February 2018), which increased library use over summer. Harriet Sabarez joined our library staff in January and is working 2 days a week. Plans for a building project, that includes extension and refurbishment of the library, are continuing to progress.



In addition to a full-on start to Semester 2, our main focus is on preparing for the proposed redevelopment of the library building which, if all continues to go to plan, will commence in late 2018. Alison and Ruth were both part of two planning days with library designer, Kevin Hennah. Ruth continues to work on a full weed of the library and Harriet is busy boxing up journals to go into storage. Ruth appreciated attending the recent ANZTLA Conference and Alison is attending the APLIC Conference, July 30<sup>th</sup>—August 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Harriet added that they would be increasing the current library space and removing 75% of the current print collection. Some titles will go into storage, while others are being given away.

### St Athanasius Library

Over the summer, many of the foreign language books we had sitting on the donation shelves were catalogued and added to the Coptic Studies collection at Eporo Tower.

Preparations for second semester are well underway, and we are also purchasing for the Coptic Symposium that will be held in July.

Some PowToon instructional videos for students have been developed and will be released on the Library's Facebook page as the semester progresses. They will also be on display on the large screen in the Eporo Tower library when classes are being held on that campus.


The start to Semester 2 has been quiet, with most SAC students now taking classes online. Deborah is currently investigating LibGuides in the hope of improving the Library's online presence.

Deborah is also working on re-cataloguing older books which are likely to be unique in Trove, in preparation for uploading the collection to Libraries Australia.

Gehan Aboud is now working at Eporo as a volunteer one night a week during semester. The new library is attracting more students than the Donvale campus due to its proximity to other universities, places of work, and homes.

### Melbourne School of Theology and Eastern College Australia

Eastern College Australia started moving some journals late last year. Then in November and December we made the transition from Mulgrave to Wantirna of around 85,000 items. A lot of packing and unpacking books, then dismantling the shelves and reconstructing the shelves, moving



Melbourne School of Theology books and shelves to make room for the Eastern collection at the other end. We worked very hard, with four extra workers. They said it couldn't be done in the time span, but we did the bulk of the moving before the students came back for the January summer school.

We are now readjusting our resources to suit the needs of the students. We started putting the journals in order and will be doing a stocktake. There is a lot of culling and sending literature to a better place. We are now feeling settled at the Library at MST.

We have two libraries merging into one. We have a shipping container load of books that has to be emptied by the end of the year and we are about halfway through. The books that are not emptied will have to be rehomed, or they go out with the container. As we process each book, we are checking the catalogue details, putting duplicates in another collection and then shelving them in the limited space we have left.

We are also merging the collections, one is the Pettee classification and the other Dewey, in favour of Dewey. All the items are being sorted into standard size books, folios and large folios. It is a huge job.

We are also trying to merge our online databases as a hub to be more streamlined for the users.

## Redemptorist Library; Social Justice Library and the Patrick Murphy Memorial Library

The Redemptorist Library has benefitted from a large number of new books on Systematic Theology; Moral Theology; Sociology and Pastoral Care; and Old Testament and Biblical languages in the last few weeks due to several members of the academic and research scholars moving to different houses in Glen Iris; Keysborough; Galong (NSW) and Auckland, NZ. This is to allow for expanded student numbers arriving from Indonesia and other parts of Asia for theological training at YTU. Some of the books are not held on the UDCat so make a valuable contribution to the overall collection in Melbourne; others are only held by DML but not by libraries in the Eastern suburbs. Books can be borrowed on ILL. Check the catalogue by searching for Redemptorist Library catalogue (note we use an old modified form of Dewey, the Lynn Murphy classification system, so the call numbers will be a bit unfamiliar and 'odd'.)

Having taught missiology and interreligious dialogue at YTU since 1984 Prof. Jacob Kavunkal SVD embarked this year on starting a new mission in Myanmar by invitation of Cardinal Charles Bo. Fr Jacob was trained in Pune, India, then achieved his Doctorate in Missiology from the Gregorian



University in Rome. He taught at the Pontifical Athenaeum, Pune for over 20 years and in Chicago, the Philippines and Sri Lanka before coming to Australia. Now retiring from teaching at YTU, he is leading this new Divine Word Missionaries venture in Myanmar. I will miss him greatly in the library for his advice and guidance in book selection.

The Social Justice Library would welcome more use, it is a well-resourced collection with only one small group using it. The catalogue can be accessed as above, both libraries on the same catalogue.

Patrick Murphy Memorial Library, Divine Word Missionaries - there are several key changes to SVD academics there too. Fr Jacob Kavunkal SVD is now teaching in Burma / Myanmar a new missionary venture for the SVDs. His replacement will arrive mid-year. Several of the older missionaries will move to the community in Epping, NSW and will be greatly missed. The library is busy with students well into their theology courses.


Since the last meeting we have had large donations of new books from Professor Anthony Kelly CSsR, of Australian Catholic University (Systematic theology); Rev. Dr. Michael Mason CSsR (Sociology and Pastoral Research) and Prof. Brian Johnstone CSsR (Moral theology). A great addition to the library and the whole University of Divinity theological collection. These residents of Kew have moved to Galong, NSW and Glen Iris to make way for several students from Indonesia and Thailand etc who will be studying at Yarra Theological Union once they have completed English classes. Kew monastery will be the centre of studies for Redemptorist seminarians.

## Mannix Library

Over the summer the library has commenced its first ever stocktake which is taking much longer than first anticipated!

We are obtaining quotes at the moment for new security gates and some compactus shelving.

The Library has created a new Goold special collection named after the first Archbishop of Melbourne. An Australian Research Council grant is funding a joint project between the University of Melbourne and the University of Divinity which is looking at Goold's contribution to the cultural life of colonial Melbourne, especially through his art collection, library and his patronage of architecture (i.e. St Patrick's Cathedral). A Goold Symposium was held in February which included papers on these key themes. Mannix Library has discovered over 600 items in its collection that previously belonged to the Archbishop. A number of items of interest were prepared by Huw and placed on display in the library as part of the Symposium.



Mannix Library has recently installed a new compactus in the Main Library. This has allowed us to move our rare books and Goold Collection upstairs from the compactus room on the ground floor. Current journal subscription volumes from 2010+ are being retained upstairs but anything pre 2010 has been relocated downstairs. These moves are part of a plan to create a Rare Books/Special Collections room within the Main Library.

The Library experienced a flood in June which resulted in the loss of several hundred books.

Kerrie attended the ATLA conference in Indianapolis in June and presented a paper on Collaborative Library projects at the University of Divinity.

We are currently exploring options for a possible new LMS for Mannix Library and new interface for the Library Hub.

## University of Divinity

Several new databases have been added to the Library Hub in 2018.

A new combined library catalogue has been launched – <https://divinity.on.worldcat.org/discovery> UDCat allows the simultaneous searching of the holdings of multiple University of Divinity libraries. The search can also be expanded to include WorldCat, the world's most comprehensive library database, enabling users to identify resources held in library collections around the world. At the moment UDCat includes the holdings of 6 libraries with several others expected to join over the course of the year as their holdings are added to Libraries Australia.

# ANZTLA 2018 Statistics

*ANZTLA Statistician*

ANZTLA Statistics are compiled annually from data provided by ANZTLA member libraries on a voluntary basis. All ANZTLA Libraries are encouraged to contribute their data.

The reporting categories are described as follows:

- **A** - Provides clergy training programmes (ie: The Australian and New Zealand Association of Theological Schools [ANZATS] member schools) and/or school and training institutions which offer broad theological training (ie: Bible Colleges, Missionary Training Institutions) possibly leading to degree or post-graduate qualifications;
- **B** - Do not have students (ie: church administrative libraries, resource centres, para-church organisations, etc.); and
- **C** - Institutions offering non-theological courses in addition (ie: teacher training).

Data has been entered as submitted by the libraries. Any questions should be directed to the libraries concerned.

Of the 73 institutional members in 2018, 36 statistics questionnaires were returned (a number after the due date), equating to a 49.3% return rate, up from the previous year, but due (in part) to a number of library mergers.






