# GETTING READY FOR RDA: PART 2, FRAR AND RDA SCENARIOS

In the first article in this series, I gave an overview of Functional Requirements for Bibliographic Records (FRBR) as a conceptual model. In this article, I will discuss its companion document, Functional Requirements for Authority Records (FRAR), and then look at how RDA envisions these models affecting library catalogs.

FRAR takes the ten entities defined in FRBR (person, corporate body, work, expression, manifestation, item, concept, object, event, and place) plus one more (family), defines them, identifies their attributes and delineates the relationships between them in library contexts. There is an acknowledgement that there could be other definitions, attributes and relationships developed in other contexts, but they are not elaborated.

The entity definitions and relationships noted here mirror the definitions and relationships delineated in FRBR and are the ones in common use in the library world. Where FRAR goes beyond current authority file data is in its list of attributes of the entities. For example, the list of attributes for a person includes: dates, such as birth and death; titles, such as rank, office, honor, etc.; other designations, such as "Saint," "Spirit," "Jr.," etc.; gender; place of birth/place of death; country with which the person is identified; place of residence; affiliation; address of place of residence/business/employer; language in which the person writes; field of activity; profession/occupation; and biography/history. Some of these attributes are routinely recorded in the authority records currently created, but many, such as gender and current address have not been recorded in authority work done in this country. Those attributes are recorded in authority records in other countries, such as France.

If the cataloging world were to embrace FRBR and FRAR, how would it differ from what we do now? The biggest difference would be in the way we present data to users. Most library catalogs today are arranged in a simple alphabetical order. The OCLC catalog, while containing far more items than most other catalogs, is representative of the way data is organized. If a particular search key retrieves enough similar entries, they might be subarranged by type, so you must first choose a type of resource. Following that, the materials are arranged in a simple alphabetical order, title main entries followed by author main entries, subarranged by title. I searched C.S. Lewis, Chronicles of Narnia and retrieved ninety-five books. When I clicked on that line, I was presented by a set of brief records, arranged by title. However, the entry began with the main entry, then the title, so the arrangement followed thus: Aslan ... as a title main entry, followed by Thomas, Frederick, then Riordan, James, then Willhelmson, Peter, then Bellah, Mike. Since the arrangement was by title, the computer ignored the author names and subarranged strictly by title. In one catalog I searched, I found thirty titles, all formats together, with no discernable subarrangement. To a user, this arrangement must look entirely random! To find what is needed, the user has to look through all the entries, perhaps opening the full record to be able to make a decision on which fits their needs.

What if we could present the data in an organized manner, with each type of resource, each translation, each variation of the text sorted in an intelligible way? This is what a FRBRized catalog attempts to do:

In this example, following the work, the arrangement is by expression (print + language vs videorecording + language). Subarranged under each expression is each manifestation (publisher, translator, illustrator). Subarranged under each manifestation would be each item (location, ownership, etc.)

This display represents a much easier presentation for users to navigate than our traditional display. Here they don't have to page through five, seven or ten screens of manifestations, arranged in no perceivable order to find the particular edition they need. They can see at a glance the important information about each expression and manifestation. If they want an English edition and don't particularly care which one, they could put a hold at the expression level and get whichever manifestation returned first. If they want a particular edition, they can easily sort out which one will fit their needs.

So, how do we get here from our traditional displays? *RDA* attempts to show us the way. *RDA* represents an attempt to take the theory of *FRBR* and *FRAR* and embody them in a set of practical cataloging rules. How successful *RDA* has been is the subject of a great debate at this time. To help envision how *RDA* can be used, the editors have developed three Implementation Scenarios. See

http://www.collectionscanada.gc.ca/jsc/docs/5editor2.pdf for the graphic representations of these scenarios. These scenarios are represented below in reverse order from the RDA

editors' presentation in order to show a progression from current cataloging to a fully functioning FRBR/FRATR model.

**Scenario 3**: This scenario reflects the state of many OPACs today. There are bibliographic records, and there are authority records. All attributes of the Group 1 entities are carried in the one bibliographic record and a possibly associated holding record. Authority and bibliographic records are not linked, so changes to authority records are not automatically reflected in the bibliographic records.

**Scenario 2**: This scenario reflects the state of OCLC and many other OPACs. There are still bibliographic records which carry all the Group 1 attributes, and there are authority records. In this scenario, the authority records are linked to the bibliographic records, so a change to an authority record will automatically change the heading on related bibliographic records. However, the authorized form of heading is stored in the bibliographic record, not just an identifier pointing to the authorized heading.

**Scenario 1**: This scenario represents a relational/object-oriented database structure. There are no longer bibliographic and authority records. There are work records, expression records, manifestation records, item records, personal entity records, corporate entity records, family entity records, concept entity records, object entity records, event entity records, and place entity records. Each of these records contains only the attributes (characteristics) which pertain to it. They are linked by externally imputed attributes such as assigned identifiers.

Thus, a work record will contain only those attributes which relate to the work, such as uniform title, subject identifiers, and any persons, corporate bodies, families pertaining to the work, such as the creator.

The expression record will contain only the attributes which pertain to the expression, such as language, particular title of the expression, notes relating to the expression, and any persons, corporate bodies, and families associated with the expression. These might be designated by assigned identifiers, rather than by the actual names.

The manifestation record will contain only information which pertains to the manifestation, such as the edition, publisher, notes on the manifestation, pagination, size, etc.

The item record will contain only information about the specific item, such as copy number, classification, bar code, and owner.

When it comes time to display the record to the patron, the computer will construct a bibliographic display which will contain the information needed by the patron, including replacing the identifiers with the actual content.

What does this mean for how catalogers will work in this brave new world? Every day, we determine the attributes which relate to each of the Group 1 entities. We just don't think of them that way:

To create a catalog record, we:

Determine main entry, uniform title, subject headings (Work)

Transcribe information about translators, scales of maps, playing times of CDs (Expression)

Transcribe places of publication, publisher, dates of publication (Manifestation)

Create call numbers and add holdings information (Items)

So, in this brave new world, it looks as if we will be doing the same things we have always done to catalog an item, just organizing the data in a new way.

Since about seventy-five percent of the works we catalog have only one work, one expression, and one manifestation, it would not make sense to create up to eleven records for each one!

Those working on this promise that the computer will do all this work behind the scenes. We will be building the records by searching for the identifiers and adding them to the record we are building. Then the computer will extract the various records.

#### CHARLESTON CONFERENCE

The Charleston Conference was held in Charleston, South Carolina November 5-8, 2008. This annual conference focuses on issues relating to the library community and is unique in that vendors and publishers not only join librarians as presenters at a vendor showcase but are invited to participate side by side with librarians in all aspects of the conference. This participation allows all parties interested in issues within the library community to be present to debate, share ideas, and learn from one another. The Charleston Conference is unique among library conferences in that it offers a large number of presentations and panel discussions that are geared towards technical services interests.

The theme of the 2008 conference was "The Best of Times...The Worst of Times." The panel and presentation topics included many areas of interest for technical services staff. Topics included, but were not limited to: serials resource management, collection development, e-books, managing e-collections, approval plans, managing library staff, license negotiations, e-publishing, digitization, preservation, the role of Google and Wikipedia in libraries, and metadata.

While it appears that many library conferences all but ignore acquisitions issues, the Charleston Conference provided many topics of interest for acquisitions professionals.

Librarians and vendors debated hot-button issues in acquisitions circles. The benefits and drawbacks of approval plans for smaller libraries were discussed as well as whether or not libraries are yielding too much to vendors in license negotiations. Some of the presentations and panel discussions were jointly presented by librarians and vendors. One collaboration between the two resulted in a presentation on process improvement for libraries and vendors in order to create a better working relationship. While there were a few presentations and panel discussions that came across more as an advertising tool for vendors, I was impressed by the genuine debate that went on between librarians, vendors, and publishers.

The most talked about presentations of the conference surrounded cataloging issues. One of the most talked about sessions was given by Deanna Marcum, Associate Librarian for Library Services at the Library of Congress. Ms. Marcum spoke on the topic of bibliographic control and the Library of Congress. After a few words, Ms. Marcum opened the session to a lively question-and-answer period. She was asked some tough questions concerning what many catalogers see as the deterioration of standards of Library of Congress cataloging. One contentious issue was that of the Library of Congress's decision to stop creating and/or updating series authority information. Ms. Marcum stated her case that the Library of Congress was doing the best that they could with what they had to work with. The other presentation that caused a lot of discussion was that of University of South Carolina's Professor Heidi Hoerman. Ms. Hoerman gave a presentation on RDA. Ms. Hoerman stated that she believed RDA "will die a quiet death" and predicted an updated version of AACR2 would be published to take its place. Ms. Hoerman was very adamant on this topic. To my surprise, and I'm sure to the surprise of many others who saw Ms. Hoerman's presentation or read the slides of her presentation available on her website, Ms. Hoerman made a public reversal of her RDA stance in early January. In her email, sent to the AUTOCAT listserv and possibly other cataloging- or technical services-related listserys, Ms. Hoerman stated that she was wrong about the future of RDA. While she states that she is still trying to piece together the changes taking place in the cataloging world and the role RDA will have in respect to these changes, Ms. Hoerman no longer sees RDA as dead. The debate over RDA will most likely continue for some time.

The 2008 Charleston Conference was my first, and I could not have been happier with it. The Charleston Conference offers a wide variety of topics of interest to those in the library community. Technical services as a whole seems to get less attention at library conferences than other areas of librarianship. The Charleston Conference was a welcome surprise to me in this area. For those in technical services, especially in acquisitions, who feel their topics of interest are usually ignored at library conferences, I suggest you consider attending the Charleston Conference. At the Charleston Conference I had what I consider to be a rarity for technical services staff at a library conference—there were too many sessions of interest taking place at the same time. At the Charleston Conference, my biggest problem was narrowing down a list of interesting sessions and deciding which to attend.
