RDA UPDATE

Nathalie Schulz (Secretary, Joint Steering Committee for Development of RDA) has announced that the full draft of RDA will be available the week of November 3 for Constituency Review. It will be issued in a preliminary version of the software which will have Browse and Quick Search functionality. GETTING READY FOR RDA: PART 1, FRBR

While the publication of the finished code, *RDA (Resource Description and Access)*, is now projected for third quarter of 2009, and the implementation is perhaps a year after that, it is not too soon to begin to understand it and its implications for cataloging. To that end, I propose to write a series of articles in *TCB* exploring those acronyms, *FRBR*, *FRAD*, *RDA*, and how they will impact our work, building on the *RDA* update presentation I made at the 2008 ATLA Annual Conference in Ottawa. I hope this will benefit those who could not attend the Ottawa Conference and those who were there, but would like to hear it again.

Resource Description and Access (RDA) is built upon the theory expounded in the works, *Functional Requirements for Bibliographic Records (FRBR)* and *Functional Requirements for Authority Data (FRAD)*, both created by Working Groups of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA). In this first article, I will present a simplified explanation of *FRBR*.

FRBR is a conceptual model designed to "serve as the basis for relating specific attributes and relationships (reflected in the record as discrete data elements) to the various tasks that users perform when consulting bibliographic records." (*FRBR: Final Report*, p. 3). Although I am neither a philosopher nor a theoretician, I will attempt to give you a glimpse of that conceptual model.

Cataloging has always been based on conceptual models and those models have been increasing in complexity as the resources we catalog and the world in which we live has increased in complexity. The earliest library catalogs were inventories, simple lists of items owned by a particular library. To use a *FRBR/RDA* term, this was a "one-entity model," since the only entity recognized was the one copy being cataloged. Rare books and manuscripts catalogs often represent one-entity catalogs, since they are describing single unique copies.

A "two-entity model" is exemplified by catalogs which recognize items that come in multiple editions. The records describe manifestations such as 1st edition, 2nd edition, etc.

A "three-entity model" is exemplified by catalogs which recognize texts, as well as editions and copies, using uniform titles to collocate editions and copies with texts. Most library catalogs today would be considered "three-entity" catalogs.

FRBR is proposing a "four-entity model" which includes work in addition to texts, editions, and copies. Thus "work" in the sense of an overarching body of material which can be manifested in different forms by different persons is separate from "text" which can be issued in many different editions by many different persons.

FRBR is an entity-relationship model (ER). An ER model is a technique that specifies the structure of a conceptual model. There are three kinds of things allowed in an ER model: entities, relationships, and attributes.

Entities are things, either physical or abstract, so they can literally be anything. Relationships are interactions among entities. Attributes are properties or characteristics of either entities or relationships. *FRBR* has taken all the bibliographic entities that have been identified and sorted them into three groups.

Group One entities are: **Work**, which is realized through: **Expression**, which is embodied in: **Manifestation**, which is exemplified by: **Item**. First, we need to define these terms. **Work** is an abstract entity, defined as a distinct intellectual or artistic creation. **Expression** is an abstract entity, defined as the specific intellectual or artistic form that a work takes each time it is "realized." **Manifestation** is a concrete entity, defined as the physical embodiment of an expression of a work. **Item** is a concrete entity, defined as a single exemplar of a manifestation.

Group Two entities are: **Corporate Bodies** and **Persons**. Group Two entities represent those responsible for the intellectual or artistic content, the physical production and dissemination, or the custodianship of the entities in Group One. Thus, a **Work** is created by one or more **persons** or **corporate bodies**; an **Expression** is realized by one or more **persons** or **corporate bodies**; a **Manifestation** is produced by one or more **persons** or **corporate bodies**; an **Item** is owned by one or more **persons** or **corporate bodies**.

Group Three entities are: **Concept, Object, Event, Place**. Group Three entities represent the subject of works. A **Work** may have as its subject one or more than one **Concept, Object, Event** and/or **Place**. A **Work** may also have a subject relationship with one or more than one **Work, Expression, Manifestation, Item, Person** or **Corporate Body**.

Each entity has **attributes** associated with it. **Inherent attributes** are not only physical characteristics (physical medium and dimensions of an object), but also those which might be characterized as "labeling information" (statements appearing on the title page, cover or container). **Externally imputed attributes** are assigned identifiers such as ISSN or thematic catalog number. Attributes inherent in an entity can usually be determined by examining the entity itself; those that are imputed often require reference to an external source.

Entities have **Relationships** with one another. **Relationships** connect Group One entities to each other.

The **Work**: "Agnes Grey / by Ana Bronte" is realized through the **Expression**: "Dutch version, translated by Emy Giphart" is embodied by the **Manifestation**: "Amsterdam : Veen, 1962" is exemplified by the **Item**: "Copy 1 owned by ATLA."

Relationships connect Group One entities to Group Two entities through four relationship types.

Created by links from Person or Corporate Body to Work;
Realized by links from Person or Corporate Body to Expression;
Produced by links from Person or Corporate Body to Manifestation;
Owned by links from Person or Corporate Body to Item.

Relationships connect the entity **Work** to all other entities by **Subject**. The "has as subject" relationship indicates that any of the entities in the model, including another work, may be the subject of a work.

Work:
May be about a **Concept, Object, Event, Place**
May be about a **Person, Corporate Body**
May be about an **Expression, Manifestation, Item**
May be about another **Work**


Links ensure that a **Subject** is linked to its individual **Work** and that all **Works** relevant to a particular subject are linked to that subject.

Next time, I will look at the companion work, *Functional Requirements for Authority Data*, and how it conceives of authority records.

A “FAQ on form/genre headings” (PDF, 60 KB) has been posted on the LC Web site (http://www.loc.gov/catdir/cpsd/genre_form_faq.pdf). It contains responses to thirty-three questions related to the meaning and use of form/genre headings as well as issues of authority control and the relationship of form/genre headings to *LCSH*.

440/490/8XX

Just in case you haven’t gotten the word, it’s time to change our ways (if you haven’t already...). The implementation date of October 24, 2008 given to PCC members has passed, and so has the 440 (See <http://www.loc.gov/catdir/pcc/Field440.pdf>). From now on, PCC members will be coding series titles either 490 0 (1st indicator “0” meaning “not traced”) or 490 1/8XX (1st indicator “1” meaning “traced differently”). It sounds as though OCLC will be working on a way to make a global change of 440’s to 490 1/8XX’s, so it won’t be necessary to update records that already have a 440 in them.

Glenn E. Patton (Director, WorldCat Quality Management) posted a note on the OCLC-CAT listserv on 10/29/2008 reporting that OCLC is planning to implement this change in series tracing in the future although no definitive decisions have yet been made. Until then, Patton says “if libraries wish to discontinue use of 440 now, they may do so. No MARC changes are necessary to accommodate the new PCC guidelines, since they represent essentially a change in policy.”
