## **THE MANAGEMENT OF WEB RESOURCES IN RELIGION AND THEOLOGY**

Within the last ten years, the development and expansion of the Internet has had a significant impact on the scholarly world. Increasing numbers of scholarly resources are available electronically, including e-journals, e-books, and electronic databases. Many of these electronic resources are nevertheless available only through paid subscriptions. There is, however, a group of other electronic resources that are freely available to anyone with access to the Internet: web sites. While there was a time when the vast majority of what could be found on the web tended to be of questionable scholarly merit, there are now a significant number of freely accessible web sites of substantial scholarly content.

Many of these sites are sponsored by or at least affiliated with leading academic institutions. For example, the ETANA site ([www.etana.org](http://www.etana.org)) is a joint project of a number of scholarly institutions, including the American School of Oriental Research, Case Western Reserve University, the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago, and Vanderbilt University. This site, freely available to anyone with access to the Internet, incorporates both full-text access to some of the most important scholarly writings on the

Ancient Near East as well as a search engine (ABZU) for locating on the Internet other scholarly resources in this area. Another example would be the University of Virginia's Religious Movements Home Page (<http://religiousmovements.lib.virginia.edu>), a site that provides profiles of hundreds of religious movements written by scholars in the field of religious studies. Still a third example would be the Ancient Maps of Jerusalem site ([www.jnul.huji.ac.il/maps-of-jerusalem/](http://www.jnul.huji.ac.il/maps-of-jerusalem/)), a joint project of Jewish National and University Library and the Department of Geography at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. This site presents maps of the city of Jerusalem dating as far back as the fifteenth century.

The issue for the academic librarian is how to make resources such as these three sites available to the patrons of the library. Most users locate web sites through search engines such as Google. The problem with this method of access is that search engines do not have the capability of distinguishing between web sites of scholarly merit and sites of questionable content. For example, a recent search on Google of "Ancient Near East" resulted in over 150,000 results. While many of these are probably excellent sites, many more are probably not. The ETANA site, interestingly, does not appear in the first 100 listings. Thus, the researcher who would benefit from access to ETANA but who does not know of its existence will likely not stumble across it using Google.

One popular method of providing access to web sites of scholarly content has been the posting of the URLs for such sites on one of the library's own web pages. There are, however, drawbacks to this approach. Many users are more habituated to searching for resources through the library's catalog or through an indexing database and may not bother to check out a list of recommended web sites. If the list is extensive, it may be organized topically, but without a search mechanism, it will still tend to be more difficult for the user to search than the typical OPAC. The task for the librarian of keeping such a list up to date is also an enormous undertaking. Not only do web sites occasionally disappear or change URLs (this happens even for sites of scholarly content), but also new and worthwhile sites are constantly appearing on the web.

Librarians have been aided in the task of becoming aware of what is of value on the web by published reviews and guides to web resources. These are helpful tools, and some of them are themselves web sites. In the field of theology and religion there are a number of these, many of which are excellent: for example, the *Wabash Center Guide to Internet Resources for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion* ([www.wabashcenter.wabash.edu/Internet/front.htm](http://www.wabashcenter.wabash.edu/Internet/front.htm)) and the *Religious Studies web Guide* ([www.acs.ucalgary.ca/~lipton/subject.html](http://www.acs.ucalgary.ca/~lipton/subject.html)). Some libraries simply post a listing of these Internet guides for users interested in what is on the web. However, while the existence of such sites alleviates part of the problem for the librarian, there is still the issue of the user who may be searching for resources in a particular subject area (such as the Ancient Near East) and who may not even be aware that the web is a potential source for the kind of resources he or she is seeking.

The traditional method of making scholarly resources available to library patrons has been through the library catalog. Many libraries, however, do not include web sites in

their OPACs. There are a number of reasons for this omission, including the erroneous belief that there is little of value on the web along with the view that users already know how to access web resources using search engines such as Google. The strongest reason for excluding web sites from the library's catalog is simply that the task of cataloging such resources is difficult and time-consuming. Web sites are not like material that is purchased and owned by the library; they are continually being developed, occasionally change their URLs, are not always maintained, and even disappear. It is perhaps even more difficult to keep track of changes to web sites when they are in the catalog than when they are posted on a list for users. The library may already have a schedule for periodically checking URL links posted on a list, but if the resource is simply another item in the catalog, it is less likely that the URL link will be checked on a regular basis. For these reasons, many libraries have simply chosen not to go to the effort of including web sites in their catalogs.

A group of ATLA librarians, recognizing the importance and value of providing access to scholarly web sites to their patrons, has recently come together to try to work out a solution to this problem. The daunting tasks of selecting, cataloging, and maintaining web resources in the library catalog could be better managed if done cooperatively rather than attempted by individual libraries. The basic idea is for librarians from ATLA libraries to share in these tasks.

The proposal that has been put forward for managing web sites involves the division of labor into three groups of librarians. The first group would undertake the task of selecting appropriate sites. Agreed-upon criteria would have to be developed for assessing the scholarly value of sites. A submission form on the ATLA web site is also being considered as a way for any ATLA member librarian to recommend a site. The group of selectors would then be charged with the task of assessing and making the decision about which sites ought to be cataloged.

A second group would share in the task of cataloging the selected sites. Standards for the cataloging of web sites have evolved over the years, and most recently a new category of materials, Integrating Resources, has been created that covers web sites as well as other resources such as loose-leafs. Integrating resources are understood to be resources that differ both from traditional monographs and from serials. Unlike monographs, they are not static and so are more like serials in that they continue to change. However, unlike serials, which are issued in discrete parts, integrating resources such as web sites are added to or changed by means of updates that do not remain discrete and are integrated into the whole. One of the needs for the cataloging group would be to learn and apply a set of common standards for the cataloging of web sites, based on the training material for integrated resources that has been developed by the Serials Cataloging Cooperative Training Program under the auspices of CONSER.

The third group would be charged with the task of periodically reviewing the sites that had been cataloged, noting any changes, updating the catalog records, and informing the membership of the updates. One crucial component to the project would be the ability to create a specified ATLA collection set in OCLC for these records. This would allow

libraries to batch import the web sites selected by ATLA librarians into their OPACs and also replace outdated records with a new set. The record set would also be available for purchase by non-OCLC libraries. Currently, members of the project are in the process of negotiating with OCLC for the creation of such a record set.

At this point, the project is still in its very early stages. Many issues need to be resolved: the criteria for selection, the establishment of cataloging standards, negotiations with OCLC, and the development of a workflow among the different groups for accomplishing each task in the project. Although it is still quite early, interest in the project has grown considerably since its initial launching at the ATLA meeting in June 2003. A listserv has been created, and from an initial core group of about fifteen interested librarians, membership in the listserv has grown to over fifty members. Librarians interested in participating or simply finding out more about the project are encouraged to join the listserv.<sup>1</sup> Since a submission form for possible web sites to consider has not yet been created, interested readers can post their recommendations on the listserv or send them directly to me at amy.limpitlaw@vanderbilt.edu. A final hope we have for this project is that once fully launched, it may serve as a model for other subject area librarians interested in providing access to some of the excellent resources available on the web in their subject areas.

## BIBLICAL CRITICISM MEETS LCSH: TEXTUAL CRITICISM

If you like putting puzzles together, then textual criticism is the game for you. The goals of textual criticism, according to the *Handbook of Biblical Criticism*, are “(1) to reconstruct the original wording of the biblical text; and (2) to establish the history of the transmission of the text through the centuries.”<sup>1</sup>

Why is textual criticism necessary? Because we don’t have the originals of the biblical texts; all we have are copies made from the originals, which were painstakingly copied by hand, one by one, line by line, by scribes on leather or papyrus scrolls. Many of the copies we have are only fragmentary; some have gaps (lacunae) in them due to physical damage from such problems as decay and insect gnawing; and all have errors or changes in them.

Gordon D. Fee's essay entitled "Textual Criticism of the New Testament"<sup>2</sup> does in fourteen pages what is attempted here in a few paragraphs. In that article, he explains that the task of the textual critic is to compare all of the extant texts, detect all of the mistakes and changes, and then decide which of those texts is the closest to the (imagined) original.<sup>3</sup> This involves a methodology that concerns itself with an evaluation of the external and internal evidence. Variations in the text have resulted for many reasons, some unintentional and some not. From personal experience in the practice of calligraphy, I can attest to how easy it is to make errors when copying a text. I have frequently ended up with a beautifully written word that has, in fact, been misspelled, or a gorgeous-looking sentence that has, in fact, one less word than it had before—demonstrating my occasional lack of ability to concentrate on two things at once. Thus, it is easy to understand why the manuscript copies that we do have of biblical texts are not always quite the same. Indeed, Fee states unequivocally that no two manuscripts are exactly alike.<sup>4</sup> Fee suggests that intentional variations were probably made in an effort to "correct" the text. What kinds of errors were made makes for an interesting read, for it includes words like "dittography," "haplography," "homoioteleuton," and "homoioarchton." Ralph W. Klein summarizes the various types of errors that have arisen in texts, including the above-mentioned, in his chapter entitled "Doing Textual Criticism."<sup>5</sup> Some of these errors resulted from aural mistakes, and he interestingly notes one practice whereby manuscripts are prepared by having a group of copyists write down the text as it was being read aloud.

What are the benefits of textual criticism? Besides the satisfaction of putting together the puzzle of the original text, there are at least two other benefits. Fee describes how the reconstruction of the text affects its interpretation (not an insignificant matter) or how exegesis and textual criticism work together.<sup>6</sup> Another benefit, as noted in the *Handbook of Biblical Criticism*, is that the study of textual differences can provide "for understanding the church of the 4th cent., the status of the canon, etc., irrespective of the authenticity of the passage itself."<sup>7</sup>

One bibliographic example using this subdivision is Michael J. Gilmour's *The Significance of Parallels between 2 Peter and Other Early Christian Literature*. It has the following subject heading:
