

The 2018–2019 year for the Atla Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee was spent reassessing aspiration projects and laying groundwork for future planning and projects in the midst of several committee membership and Atla staffing changes related to the committee. As such, the committee was able to have a few programs during the year.

In particular, the committee was able to develop several monthly blog posts focused on helping the membership learn ways to support the diversity they may encounter in their institutions. Drs. James Estes and Kirk VanGilder celebrated Deaf History Month, providing a short summary of deaf and Deaf community history in the United States and ways to better meet the needs of deaf patrons as well as

providing resources for learning more about deaf culture and various organizations serving the religious needs of the Deaf and hard-of-hearing. In addition, Drew Baker celebrated Asian American and Pacific American Heritage Month in a similar fashion. The committee hopes to continue providing these resources in the coming years.

In 2019, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion scholarship received over 25 well-qualified applicants from ALA-accredited programs in the United States and Canada. The 2019 recipient is University of Toronto student Tomoko Shida. Shida is currently pursuing a Master of Information degree at the University of Toronto's iSchool. A first-generation Japanese Canadian Anglican, she has seen firsthand the harm that can be done when discourse surrounding theological doctrine and praxis fails to grapple with the social, cultural, and political realities of Indigenous and diasporic communities, as well as those outside of the global West. A longstanding concern for her, therefore, is seeing that the Christian church confronts the wrongs it has committed in the past and seeing that it participates actively in the work of reconciliation both domestically and globally. She believes that archivists and librarians can play an important role in this, by ensuring that evidence of past wrongs is not destroyed or concealed, and by amplifying Indigenous and international voices and texts within library collections.

During the 2019 conference in Vancouver, the committee sought out Alex MacCutchan of the Vancouver Public Library, who presented on VPL's project to review and update its services in order to be more inclusive for members of the Trans, Gender Variant, and Two-Spirit communities. This session explored the steps VPL undertook as it updated its programming, public services, facilities, and staff training to better meet the needs of these patrons. We thank Alex for presenting on this important topic.

During the coming year, the committee hopes to rebuild and reenergize around its work and looks forward to a successful year continuing to advance "Atla's culture that affirms the intrinsic value of all members regardless of racial, cultural, age, career stage/professional experience, sexual orientation, gender expression, expression of religious tradition, disabilities, or socioeconomic differences."

REPORT ON ATLA ANNUAL 2019

I welcome you to the traditional, ancestral, unceded lands of the han̓q̓əmin̓əm̓-speaking Musqueam people.

The conference opened with a generous welcome from Alec Dan, one of Musqueam's Knowledge Keepers. It drew our attention to the pride and ownership that First Nations people have for their culture and the loving care with which they welcome visitors to it (Metro Vancouver is home to **eleven** [First Nations](#)).

Situated in the heart of downtown Vancouver, the Sheraton Wall Centre afforded conference attendees a central location with **dozens** of options for dining, **nine** water taxi docks, sunset views from **seven** beaches, short walks to **one** famous library, and the joys of **240** shops and businesses on Granville Island.

Over **thirty** adventurous theological librarians traveled to the University of British Columbia for a pre-conference excursion. Over **200** conference attendees delighted in the arrival of snacks each day (chicken and waffles!!) at the exhibit hall where **twenty-**

five exhibitors showered attendees with new products and cool swag (Brill brought the perforated notebooks again!!!). Attendees from **fifteen** countries attended **fifty-five** concurrent sessions and pre-conference workshops.

[Three plenary speakers](#) for the conference gave practical and relevant lectures related to the Organizational Ends and Core Values of Atla. The topics addressed were: Open Access (widest possible access to relevant information and ideas), Accelerating Allyship (hospitality, inclusion, and diversity), and Evolving Faith Traditions (growth in wisdom). Ask a colleague who attended the conference to share the four definitions of Indigenization!

Especially meaningful to me this year were the **four** memorials and the recognition of **ten** retiring members. I was thankful to be reminded of the diversity of paths our members have taken, spanning decades of faithful service to the field of theological librarianship.

The **two** “business” meetings were quite good! Executive Director Brenda Bailey-Hainer recognized the dedicated work of the Atla staff and reported on the excellent fiscal numbers (**lots** of them). Outgoing president Jenny Bartholomew gave a heartfelt overview of the hard work of the Board during the re-branding process. The commitment of the **twelve** board members to the Association is evident (at least to me). Gentle and hopeful, the words outgoing President Bartholomew offered should be **counted** as one of the best presidential addresses in recent history.

The Inaugural [Atla International Theological Librarian Leadership Institute](#) took place at the conference this year. The leadership team provided a week of seminars, conference attendance, and library tours sharing best practices in theological librarianship with **three** librarians from around the world who were seeking training in theological librarianship.

A huge thank you to the **nine** members of the Conference Committee, the **two** new committee members, and the **two** outgoing members. We will be hard at work planning for the [74th Annual Conference \(2020\)](#) in Detroit, Michigan (**48226**)! You can **count** on it!

The 2018–2019 Endowment Committee held its fall meeting in October 2018 in Chicago. During the meeting, the group brainstormed about ways to reach potential donors through various marketing channels. Additional discussion focused on Atla’s upcoming 75th anniversary in 2021. Additional discussion and planning for the annual end-of-year campaign was carried on via email.

Solicitation activities during the year included an end-of-year donation campaign in late 2018 using direct mail and email solicitations. A virtual meeting was held by phone in February 2019 to discuss plans for the Atla Annual conference. Taylor and Graham attended the annual conference in Vancouver, BC in June 2019. They videotaped interviews with members and attendees talking about Atla. The Atla president’s August 2019 membership renewal letter included an invitation to donate to the Fund.

Dennis Swanson ended his term on the committee in June. Many thanks to him for his active participation on the committee and for the time he served as chair.

The Endowment Fund continues to demonstrate robust growth. During fiscal year 2019, 33 individuals made 73 donations totaling \$7,309. Atla matched these gifts and contributed an additional \$42,691 for a total contribution of \$50,000. Thanks to a strong market this year, as of August 31, 2019, the fund had a balance of \$780,811, an increase of \$100,314 over last year’s total.

During its second year, the International Theological Librarian Education Taskforce (ITLET) worked on two initiatives to achieve our charge—“to strengthen and connect theological and religious studies librarians worldwide by identifying resources, creating educational opportunities, and developing skill enhancement materials through collaboration efforts.”

The first initiative was continued development of the *Theological Librarian's Handbook*. The introductory volume is nearing completion and will be published open access by the end of this year. The second volume of the series will be chosen this next year and the writing process will begin.

The second initiative was the first ever Atla International Theological Librarian Leadership Institute held at Atla Annual 2019 in Vancouver, BC. Three global theological librarians attended the Institute: Arnel Faller from Silliman University Divinity School in Philippines, Roman Shvets from Ukrainian Evangelical Theological Seminary in Ukraine, and Nalini Premadish from Pacific Theological College

The Professional Development Committee (PDC) fosters development of librarians and related information professionals who serve theological and religious studies scholarship and study. By determining member needs, identifying expert resources, and utilizing a variety of methods and delivery mechanisms we provide professional development opportunities that facilitate the exchange of ideas and support members at every point in their careers.

At the annual Fall meeting, held in conjunction with the joint Align 2018 meeting of all committee members, interest group leaders, advisory council and task force chairs, and board members, committee members reviewed past activities, discussed future coordination of activities with the International Theological Librarianship Education Task Force, and planned for continued execution of existing programs.

During FY2019, PDC members reviewed and approved one regional grant application to fund a professional development opportunity hosted by PNWRTSLA entitled “The Yemen Manuscripts Digitization Initiative.” The PDC sponsored four webinars, three of which focused on content from popular conference programs. The webinars included: “Orientation for Atla SACO Catalogers,” “‘The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up’: The Art of Decluttering and Organizing Library Collections,” “Zotero for Librarians,” and “The Meaning of Innovation in Theological Libraries 2.0.”

While originally defined as a task force, the group was converted into the Scholarly Communication Committee this year with a regular rotation of committee members with terms.

Our first in-person meeting as a committee occurred on October 17–18 in connection with a broader strategic alignment meeting that included the Atla Board and other committees. In addition to contributing to a strategic planning discussion, we reflected on our “charge,” talked about opportunities in open educational resources (OER) development, network analysis, and Wikicite, and did planning toward the ACRL Roadshow and annual conference.

A major effort of the committee and Atla staff was sponsoring the ACRL Scholarly Communication Roadshow on Friday, February 22, 2019. The event served almost 40 attendees, including the Atla Board, and offered a number of generous travel scholarships for those outside of the greater Chicago area. This day-long interactive workshop guided participants through scholarly communication fundamentals including publishing, copyright, and library outreach, as well as providing deep dives into text and data mining issues for humanities research and open access and open education topics that are most relevant to the institutions served by Atla member libraries. The workshop was led by Carla Myers, Assistant Professor and Coordinator of Scholarly Communications at Miami University Libraries, and Rachael Samberg, Scholarly Communication Officer at the University of California – Berkeley.

The committee was pleased that the 2019 Atla Annual in Vancouver featured a number of plenary and program sessions focused around scholarly communication. Members of the committee provided particular leadership to a Wikidata editathon, a Python workshop, and a panel of those contributing to an open access volume on digital humanities.

Six members of the Public Services Interest Group met for an informal conversation and breakfast. Gerrit VanDyk (co-chair) was unable to attend the conference. After brief introductions and noting that our group was sponsoring a session at the conference (Beauty, Embodiment, and Stewardship: Theological Libraries and Theological Ecology, scheduled for 10:30am on Saturday, June 13), the group devoted most of our time discussing our group's plans and ideas for the new iteration of *Websites on Religion* as a LibGuide: <https://atla.libguides.com/>.

As discussed at our business meeting, the Public Services Interest Group has been charged with overseeing and maintaining the new iteration of *Websites on Religion* as a LibGuide. As noted on the Atla

website (<https://www.atla.com/learning-engagement/resources-for-librarianship/websites-on-religion/>):

- *Websites on Religion* is a selective, annotated collection of web resources for the study of religion. Please note, this database of resources has not been consistently maintained since 2014. Atla took ownership of the site from the Wabash Center in 2018 and will begin work on updating the links in late 2019.
- This resource site was launched by the Wabash Center in the 1990s through the dedicated efforts of Charles Bellinger. It was officially named “The Guide to Internet Resources for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion” and was also referred to as “The Internet Guide.”
- When the Wabash Center realized that the scope and purposes of the site fit better with trained librarians than with the Wabash Center’s mission to support critical reflection on teaching practices, Atla was pleased to take over the site in 2018.

David and Gerrit had a video conference meeting with Christine Fruin in the autumn of 2018 to discuss the PSIG’s interest in fostering the transition to LibGuide format and coordinate updating the links. Atla staff subsequently decided to separate the tasks, recruiting Atla members to move the content of the current site and asking PSIG members to oversee the content once the conversion to a LibGuide has been completed.

At the meeting and in email correspondence, the group has discussed how to go about this, while recognizing that before making any detailed plans it would be best to see how the LibGuide is structured and then collaborate among members of PSIG to determine whether we will want to revise the structure somewhat.

Broadly speaking, we have agreed that, rather than considering this an index of every website on religion (which Google can sort-of provide), it would be more useful to craft a carefully curated list of a few, select free online resources arranged topically, and that it would be best for a few members of the group to each take responsibility for a broad area, and recruit others to assist with curation as may be

helpful. While such selection will necessarily be subjective, we have identified the following criteria to guide our judgment:

- a. Websites that are sponsored by/affiliated with an academic institution or maintained by a faculty member at an institution (e.g., “Assisting You to Learn”)
- b. Official, organizational websites of various religious groups or denominations or historical societies
- c. Websites that provide (legal) online access to relevant primary sources and to tools that help patrons make use of such sources, such as lexica, e.g., Perseus Project, CCEL, hymnary.org)
- d. Websites that provide access to a variety of texts that reflect various perspectives (vs. websites that seek to promote a single point of view)
- e. Websites that are regularly maintained and updated
- f. Websites that we have personally used and found helpful (e.g., STEP Bible)

The group plans to meet virtually and collaborate over email to make more definite and detailed plans once the LibGuide has been completed, which is projected to be in the fall of 2019.

Technical Services

Michael Bradford

The Technical Services Interest Group (TSIG) Business Meeting was held on Friday, June 14, 2019. Ondrea Murphy (secretary) was absent from the conference this year and Michael Bradford volunteered to keep notes to share later.

Steering Committee Election

Chairman Richard Lammert was unable to determine the rotation of officers coming off of the Steering Committee and to recruit new candidates in time to hold an election at the meeting. He will follow-up with a webinar meeting and figure out next steps for an election.

Online Conversations via Video Conference

It was suggested to have an ongoing set of Technical Services conversations via webinar/Zoom meeting. Richard will reach out to Member Services to determine technical infrastructure needs that the Association could provide. Topics from the preconference email discussions on the TSIG listserv could act as a starting off point for these conversations.

EBSCO Historical Monographs Project

Richard met with Brenda Bailey-Hainer last year and was able to determine enough matching information was available in the existing spreadsheets, which did not need manual intervention by a cataloger. There are some leftovers and Richard will follow-up.

CC:DA Update (Donna Wells)

Most of the discussions that occurred at the CC:DA sessions at ALA Midwinter in Seattle surrounded the revisions to RDA. The “real work” of the committee will begin after the revisions occur.

CONSER Funnel Survey (Michael Bradford)

Michael received the results from the CONSER Funnel interest survey that was published earlier this spring. He is looking at the results (not many respondents, which was expected due to the specialized nature of the funnel). He will share the survey results and analysis with the Professional Development Committee and determine next steps and reach out to the interested survey respondents who qualify for the funnel.

TCB Update (Leslie Engelson)

The transition to the OJS platform is complete. The editorial board will remain the same next year and Leslie will be returning as editor again. Leslie put a call out for *Testimony* articles.

SACO Funnel Update (Richard Lammert)

A SACO Funnel webinar will occur by the end of September, which is also the end of the Library of Congress' fiscal year. Richard gave the names of interested members to LC and he will soon be sending out a Doodle poll to schedule with participants. The webinar will also be publicized via the PDC webinar programming, open to all.

Atla 2020 Detroit Possible Sessions

Walk-through of the new RDA, which is expected to be launched by February 2020. Donna Wells volunteered to lead a conversation group, because of her role on CC:DA, but intimated that she's not an expert.

TROT Revision

Atla Annual conference session: "So Your School is Becoming More Religiously Diverse"

Over the past decade, many Atla member institutions have become increasingly religiously diverse. From larger actions, like starting new interreligious programs or partnering with other institutions, to smaller steps, like changing branding and programming, many institutions have actively sought to become more ecumenical and/or interreligious and attract more students from religious traditions beyond the institutions' particular historical traditions. Given this reality, how can librarians at these schools adapt to serve their increasingly religiously diverse students better? What do librarians whose institutions are moving in more ecumenical or inter-religious directions need to consider? From collection development to reference and instruction, this panel will reflect on their topic as the panelists raise important questions and provide helpful practical advice based on their experiences at their own institutions.

III. INSTITUTIONAL AND INDIVIDUAL UPDATES

Patrick Milas, Sage Library at New Brunswick Theological Seminary

The Sage Library celebrates several accomplishments, including: an updated online catalog, updated print serials program, a new Faculty and Alumni Monographs Book Reading/Signing series, a new monthly thematic book display program, an updated social media campaign, and new video tutorials about library services. Sage Library partnered with the NBTS Archives and members of the Reformed Church in

America to host “the Dutch in Two Worlds Revisited: a Rare Books and Manuscripts Exhibition.”

Jay Blossom, In Trust Center for Theological Schools

I’m in an unusual position in that I am not at a seminary or educational institution. Instead, I work for an organization that serves about 230 seminaries, theological schools, and related nonprofit organizations, including a relatively small number of Episcopal schools and a large number of schools from other traditions. I am, however, an active Episcopalian and the rector’s warden at Saint Mark’s Episcopal Church in Philadelphia.

One of my chief interests with regards to the work of Atla is the relationship between librarians and the boards of their institutions. I realize that, at most schools, there is very little interaction between librarians and boards—unless (as is true in a small number of institutions) the librarian is on the board (e.g., as a faculty representative) or staffs a committee (e.g., the board’s curriculum committee). I fear this may lead board members to not think about the library very much except as a cost center. However, my research for the presentation I did for Atla suggests that many board members are proud of their libraries and see them as crown jewels for the institution, even while they may have little knowledge of what librarians actually do.

I would love to see librarians continue to find ways to show the value of information sciences not only to students but to boards as well. I know that librarians work very hard to get access to students—to show them the value of finding multiple reputable resources, to understand complex databases, to expose them to archives and special collections where the real fun or research often is located. But I think that it would be great if librarians also had some access to boards to show them that libraries are not just buildings that house collections and that librarians are the information specialists that are needed in this age of information-as-a-fire-hose.

Cindy Derrenbacker, Whitley College

I have lived half my life in Canada working mostly as a theological librarian (getting a professional start at the largest Anglican seminary in Canada), but most recently as an architecture librarian. In January 2019, I moved to Melbourne, Australia as my husband is the new Dean of Trinity College Theological School—an historic Anglican college

in the southern hemisphere. I am now getting to know one of Atla's partner associations, ANTZLA, in my role as Librarian for Whitley College, a theological school in the Baptist tradition.

I recently joined my library and Atla. However, in August I completed my M.L.S. degree from Emporia State University, and I've now stepped into the role of full librarian at Western Seminary.

Received national attention when the basketball team made the NCAA tournament, otherwise the situation is a bit gloomy. The Dean and Associate Dean both resigned, the library lost two professional positions and were only allowed to replace one—hired someone particularly for instruction. However, the new president starts this summer.

MIDWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Obtained the Overdrive collection of online commentaries—a very popular addition! Started a summer reading program. Renovations to the library will begin in August or September, starting with the first floor, while all books will be packed up during the process. An electronic resources librarian was hired in February.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The Seminary has a new president—Jamie Dew, hired away from Southeastern. The library joined the Louisiana consortium. A part-time archivist was hired to deal with the extensive backlog. In conversation with Jim Henry of FBC Orlando to acquire his collection. Gained the Joe McKeaver cartoon collection. Free shelving was picked up from Loyola University. Forced to buy new

computer equipment when the server fried. Ky St. Amant celebrated 15 years of service!

SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

One of the most popular professors, Jamie Dew, was hired to be the new president at New Orleans Seminary. The acquisitions coordinator retired after 20 years of service, his replacement is a former library assistant as well as a PhD student. The library acquired the collection of Dr. George Braswell, former SE professor and the first Baptist missionary to Iran. Processing that collection, the new books and the steady stream of text books and library books for the prison ministry keep the technical services department very busy.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Adam Greenway is the new president of SWBTS, and Randy Stinson the new provost. The Baptist Heritage Center is being renamed the B.H. Carroll Center for Baptist History and Missions. All the extension centers were closed except Darrington. The library acquired the collection of Millard Erickson.

The Lutheran Denominational Group met in-person during the Atla Annual conference in Vancouver, Canada. During the meeting, the group formalized its description, purpose, charge, and plan of organization. In addition, initial discussions were held around a future LibGuide focused on Lutheran reference resources and future collaborations regarding archives and Lutheran libraries.

DESCRIPTION OF LUTHERAN DENOMINATIONAL GROUP

The Lutheran Denominational Group is a group composed of individuals serving Lutheran institutions & collections or that have an interest in Lutheran higher education. The group meets annually to offer an opportunity for its members to update one another about what our institutions have been working on and hope to accomplish in the future.

PURPOSE

The Lutheran Denominational Group provides a space to share successes, challenges, and mentorship for those serving Lutheran-related collections and archives.

CHARGE

To collaborate and create connections for professional development.

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION

As a loosely-structured organization, the Lutheran Denominational group mostly functions through an annual convener, who coordinates any *ad hoc* committees that come from the annual meeting.

ARCHIVES DISCUSSION

The various archives and Lutheran higher education libraries scattered around the United States do not have a consistent, formal relationship, regionally or nationally. A future, concentrated effort to connect the needs of the archives and libraries to the congregational, regional, and national church may lead to better work together. There is a particular concern around the orphaning of smaller collections that may or may not be known by the greater community. Working together to craft stories and narratives that show the importance of the documents to the mission of their respective constituencies may be a way to fundraise for the long-term success of these various archives. A hope to have a future gathering of the leadership of the archives of Lutheran Churches in the United States was expressed. Questions of funding to come together were raised.

INSTITUTIONAL UPDATES:

Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago: Christine Wenderoth retired on June 30, 2019. JKM is looking for a new director and LSTC hired three new faculty in 2018–2019, with one more search in process.

Wartburg Theological Seminary: Wartburg will have a very large new student cohort this Fall. In addition, they have joined the Digital Theo-

logical Library.

Luther Seminary: May 2019 was the launch/first cohort of the MDivX 2-year program.

Concordia-Fort Wayne: Just completed a two-year inventory project. Working on its institutional self-study for ATS and assurance argument for the Higher Learning Commission. Costs are increasing, as the State of Indiana is no longer paying for discovery & delivery services.

Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary: New Rector & Dean, Dr. Mary Shore, began in January, which is leading to reorganization. ATS self-study is under works.

United Lutheran Seminary: Organization has stabilized under its interim president. Two new faculty are joining the institution in the fall and an additional chair was established, with the area to be determined by the faculty in the future. The library and its archives have received two digitization grants.

APPROVAL OF 2018 MINUTES

The minutes of the 2018 meeting of the Methodist Librarians' Fellowship were approved with no changes.

SPECIAL SESSION OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE (FEBRUARY 23–26, 2019 – ST. LOUIS, MO)

The group briefly shared local reactions to the decisions made by the special session that was called to act on a report of the Commission on a Way Forward regarding issues of human sexuality in *The Book of Discipline*. Some expressed anxiety and uncertainty, and we are waiting to see what will happen at the General Conference scheduled for May 5–15, 2020, in Minneapolis, MN.

UNITED METHODIST CONFERENCE JOURNAL COLLECTION

In response to an inquiry about which conference journals our institutions collect, a couple of libraries indicated that they only keep the conference journals for their own jurisdictions. Drew University keeps a running list of which journals they have on their website. It was noted that some of the journals come on flash drives, and PDFs have been made (some have been printed out, but not all). None are digitized. *The Book of Discipline* specifies that two copies of the conference reports are to be sent to the Methodist Archives and one to Drew Methodist Library.

ROUND ROBIN REPORTS

Brian Shetler, Drew University

The library is still without a cataloger. The backlog is growing. They have more interaction with classes. They are branching out into pop culture.

Andy Keck, Southern Methodist University

Andy expressed sadness at the loss of the Methodists who have passed away, mentioning John Baker-Batsel and Don Haymes.

Katie Benjamin, Duke University

They have a new Dean. They are replacing a circulation staff person and losing a reference person. But they are keeping things afloat. The Wesley Works project is ongoing.

Jay Wise, Indiana Wesleyan University

Their director is retiring. He noted the importance of having tech people who are also project managers. He stressed the importance

of knowing your institutional culture. They are dealing with copy-right issues.

Matthew Davis, Northeastern Seminary

They will be down to four librarians.

Tom Phillips, Claremont School of Theology

They have sold their campus. The director reports directly to the Board of Trustees. They are moving 50,000 books; the rest they are not sure what they will do with yet. They have lots of e-books. What will the faculty do? The faculty will move, embed, relocate. Student numbers have doubled. The digital library will be their main library.

Amy Limpitlaw, Boston University

They are the recipients of stained-glass windows that celebrate the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. The staff made an online exhibit of them. They have hired some new faculty.

Helen Stocker, Nazarene Theological College (UK)

She is a solo librarian. She shared information with the group about their Visiting Fellows program. Church of the Nazarene is funding the library management system.

Chris Anderson, Yale University

He spoke about their Methodist Studies program. They are working on a United Methodist studies bibliography, which they hope to finish soon. Predecessors digitized magazines and journal annual reports.

Steve Perisho, Seattle Pacific University

No news to report.

Jane Elder, Southern Methodist University

They are entering phase two of the building renovation. There is demolition and reconstruction in the library, but they will eventually be ADA-compliant

Lynn Berg, Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary

The seminary passed its ATS accreditation and is good for another ten years. The library has two new staff members, Daniel Smith (Research, Instruction, & Digital Services Librarian) and Edzen Lebita (Acquisitions & Serials Specialist).

We met Thursday, June 13, 2019, from 5:00-6:00 pm in the Junior Ballroom C at the Sheraton Vancouver Wall Centre in Vancouver, BC. Jim Pakala chaired the meeting and Margaret Alkema took minutes.

James Pakala welcomed all who were present, either because they work at a Presbyterian or Reformed seminary or because they are committed to the Presbyterian/Reformed church and faith, and then opened the discussion by asking who makes decisions about physical space at the libraries where members work. For example, who decides what artwork will be hung, how storage space will be used, etc.?

Western Theological Seminary in Michigan has some say over what

is currently in the library space, but the building maintenance department controls items that are in shared spaces. Pittsburgh Theological Seminary completed a renovation and Michelle Spomer had lots of input in the design, construction, etc. She anticipates having input into any future changes that need to be made. There is much empty wall space and she said that they are thinking about this creatively, such as the possibility of a resident artist, etc. Christopher Richardson (Union Presbyterian) noted that at times committees make these decisions at Union. Steve Crocco (Yale) says there is a “wall committee” and while there have been many meetings, only two pieces of artwork are installed!

Members present who are currently not on the Presbyterian and Reformed denominational email discussion list were encouraged to sign up personally via the Atla members website. Please contact an Atla staff member to be added to the email list. The list is very inactive, so your email inbox will not overflow as a result.

All present were asked to provide a brief update on their institution or other professional activities they have been involved with.

Christopher Richardson, Union Presbyterian Seminary

Christopher was the ATS Self-study coordinator and the staff members in the library have also been busy with ATS work. The library installed compact shelving via someone who finds used shelving and installs it. Feel free to contact Christopher for more information. Union is also updating its website.

Dora Rowe, Union Presbyterian Seminary

The library received a grant to improve its makerspace. The library also offers many child-friendly resources (e.g., Lego), and this allows parents to study while their children are suitably and safely occupied. They have a podcasting studio set up now and can film Powerpoint presentations, etc. Some nice features are a large prompting screen. They have also a glass cutter.

Daniel Baek, Vancouver School of Theology

Daniel is the only librarian there and works with a library assistant, who is currently on sick leave. The enrollment has gone up to about 80 FTE. Daniel is looking at increasing the ebook collection.

Arnel Z. Faller, Silliman University

This was Arnel's first time attending the denominational meeting. He noted that the institution he is employed at has historic ties to the Presbyterian Church.

Dan Flores, Western Theological Seminary

Beardslee Library has now become the Cook Library. Cook Library is housed in a new building with less space than the previous location. A new addition to the library space is the café on the first floor. Dan is the new director and has been on the job in this role for approximately 30 days. The library staff are also looking at increasing their digital presence and foreign language resources.

Sharon Taylor is not currently employed at a library connected to an educational institution. She is the librarian at Shadyside Presbyterian Church and has been working many hours on the library and on the archives, which are being found in many nooks and crannies of the building. The problem is that the church has no space for the archives but some interesting items have been found, such as a collection of poetry by Milton. The church has never had a professional librarian before and Sharon is trying to renew the book collection.

Steve Crocco is here personally as a Presbyterian, but not representing a Presbyterian or Reformed seminary. He reported that Yale has a large endowment fund with a subject restriction, which Yale cannot spend because the funds are so large that there are not enough resources in that subject area to spend the money. Yale is continuing with its petition to the state to change the restrictions on the fund. Steve also reported that a staff member encountered an older patron in the library, and after striking up a conversation, the staff member realized that the patron had materials of significant interest for the library. All present were reminded to take an interest in all patrons and not to underestimate who might walk through the doors.

Deanna Roberts, Union Theological – NYC at Columbia University

Deanna is working on a getting an MLIS and determining how to be a librarian while maintaining ordination status in the Presbyterian Church (USA). There are still issues surrounding the amalgamation issues of Burke Library within Columbia University. Burke staff

serve Union Theological Seminary as well as patrons from the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York Theological Seminary, and of course Columbia University. They have just hired a sixth professional staff member to deal with the many patrons in their busy library.

Michelle Spomer, Pittsburgh Theological Seminary

The library has moved into its new library space and hosted a grand opening. There are some minor problems such as photocopiers not fitting into the niches built for them, but other than similarly minor and/or annoying issues, the library space is greatly appreciated. The special collections are not back in the building yet because the HVAC system for the special collections area is not working. The recording and media room can also be used to listen to media in the library. Patrons can record themselves for homiletics courses and other community uses. Another interesting item to note is that the new Pittsburgh Theological Seminary library has office and space built for an archivist, but the institution is not willing to hire an archivist. The year the library opened, the school also changed to the semester system and made changes to the curriculum, so changes were plentiful in one academic year. The school is also looking into replacing the server for Sierra because it is aging. All options are on the table, including changing the library's ILS.

Patrick Milas, New Brunswick Theological Seminary

Patrick was not present, but reported the following via email:

It has been an incredible year at the Sage Library. Since the last institutional report, there have been several staff transitions. Rev. James Brumm (Reformed) is the new Archivist. Dr. Patrick Milas (Episcopal) is the new Director of the Library. Mr. Gerone Lockhart (Reformed) is the new Collection Services Librarian. Ms. Laura Giacobbe (Roman Catholic) is the new Public Services Librarian. A new half-time position, Library Associate for Collection Services, has just been advertised. Please direct any interested parties to: <http://www.nbts.edu/employment-at-nbts/>. Review of applications will begin July 1, 2019.

Sage Library celebrates several accomplishments, including: an updated online catalog, updated print serials

program, a new Faculty and Alumni Monographs Book Reading/Signing series, a new monthly thematic book display program, an updated social media campaign, and new video tutorials about library services. Sage Library partnered with the NBTS Archives and members of the Reformed Church in America to host “The Dutch in Two Worlds Revisited: a Rare Books and Manuscripts Exhibition.”

Next year, NBTS Library staff will serve the Southeastern Pennsylvania Theological Library Association (SEPTLA) as officers—Patrick Milas (President) and Laura Giacobbe (Secretary). Two Reformed seminaries may host the next SEPLTA meetings, including Westminster Theological Seminary and NBTS.

James Pakala, Covenant Theological Seminary

James reported that Denise Pakala is retiring this summer on June 30th. She will continue to volunteer for special projects at the library and share her skills with the library. Libraries in some other states besides Missouri have joined or are interested in joining the MOBIUS consortium, so it continues to grow. Innovative’s Sierra and their INNReach system constitute the platform and courier service speeds sharing resources among over a half-dozen states. MOBIUS and Colorado’s Prospector consortium also have a special relationship and means of sharing.

Margaret Alkema, Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary

Margaret reported that the school had its largest ever enrollment of 25 students. The seminary is also preparing for a spring ATS visit and Margaret is coordinating the self-study process. Since she is a solo librarian, this is taking up some of the time otherwise devoted to library projects.

The Atla Roman Catholic denominational group held their annual

meeting on Friday, June 13, 2019 in Junior Ballroom D at Sheraton Vancouver Wall Centre. This year's meeting included a few new faces, many familiar ones, and a few longtime members of the group were sadly missed. As always, the meeting is as much a fellowship event as one of business.

Following the customary introductions and a slightly belated approval of our minutes from last year's gathering in Indianapolis, we reviewed our old business items. Once again it was a robust year for Catholic content at the annual conference, with many of the topics this year done in collaboration with members of the Association outside of our circle and on topics of universal interest to theological librarianship. We look forward to maintaining a large presence in Detroit at the 2020 conference. Pat Lawton gave us an update from the Catholic Library Association (CLA), which included introducing us to new their new president, Jack Fritts. In addition to promoting the upcoming virtual conference in October, she also updated us on a new undertaking of getting the content of the Catholic Periodical and Literature Index (CPLI) before 1980 into electronic form. Alan Krieger then provided an update from the Catholic Research Resources Alliance (CRRA), which included information on an upcoming strategic plan and information on partnerships with Atla and others on expanding services, access, and content. Finally, as a member of the working group tasked with evaluating possible data loss from the merger of CPLI with Atla's Religion Database, I reported to the group that no problems were submitted to us for investigation. Therefore, our attention must now turn to working with the Atla staff to grow and effectively index Catholic content within the scope of the Atla Religion Database, including AtlaSerials and AtlaSerials PLUS.

Turning to new business, the group discussed how we can update our denominational home page on the Atla website through the new LibGuides interface. This is an opportunity not only to adapt our page to a new format but also to "freshen up" the content, which, while still informative, needs updating. I agreed to serve as a liaison to Atla for whatever content members would like to submit as beneficial to the whole group. Barnaby Hughes, who serves as an editor for *Theological Librarianship*, asked members to consider Catholic content to contribute to upcoming issues of the journal. Finally, Connie Song

proposed a new collaboration among members to create a best practices guide for weeding our collections, noting our distinctiveness from other libraries, both within and beyond the scope of Atla. This led to some discussion about pursuing mini-grants to invest in tools to analyze collections, such as OCLC's GreenGlass.

Before wrapping up with our closing prayer from Jim Humble (who also generously opened the meeting with a prayer), we opened the floor to any news of retirements or other transitions among the members' libraries. I reported the sudden passing of my supervisor, Dr. Karen Chan, a couple weeks ago. Beyond this news, we exhibited great stability in our organizations over the past year.

Following our meeting we posed for our hopefully-now-annual group photo which may or may not grace our denomination home page due to peculiar sunlight issues. After a period of time to freshen up and relax, we reassembled later that evening for our traditional group dinner at Provence Marinaside, during which time the Toronto Raptors won the NBA championship and the sun set after 9 pm. It was a uniquely Canadian experience.

reports of inaccurate results from searches in RDB compared to CPLI. The task force contacted AtlaRC list members and CLA members asking for data.

- No issues were reported or replicated. Therefore, there is no basis or information that Atla can use to investigate the problem. We need to realize that CPLI, as remembered by many, is basically gone. Atla is open to discussions regarding journals and magazines to add, since many resources we use might not normally be considered (e.g., *Our Sunday Visitor*).

IV. New Business

A. Atla LibGuides Project (David Kriegh)

- Atla has approached us to think about working on a denominational LibGuide. Elyse Hayes offered as a start one that they had borrowed and revamped.
- David has volunteered to be the liaison to Atla for this project, but it would be good for the group to step up and find someone willing to update and continue the architecture of such a guide.
- Noted communications that Atla plans to discontinue support of the old guides when the website is overhauled. While subject areas are still pertinent and interesting, they could use some freshening up and Atla and associated groups may be seeking volunteers for this.

B. Theological Librarianship

- Barnaby Hughes is looking for Catholic content such as reviews and articles for upcoming issues of *Theological Librarianship*. Please contact him with any ideas.

C. Weeding Project

- Connie Song (Atheneum) is interested in putting together a best practices list for weeding theological collections, as our needs are much different from other library types. Stephen Sweeny, Jim Humble, and Mary Sepulveda have expressed interest in such a project. Others who may be interested should contact Connie Song.

D. Retirements and Transitions

- Your prayers are asked for the repose of the soul of Dr. Karen

Chan, who was killed in a head-on collision on her way to her new home in Texas. She was wrapping up her tenure as the Academic Dean of St. Patrick's Seminary & University in Menlo Park and making plans to spend more time with family.

Robert Roethemeyer

John David Baker-Batsel (1933–2018)

John David Baker-Batsel, the second library director of Graduate Theological Union (1977–1990) and the first in our new library facility, passed away in Longmont, Colorado, on November 28, 2018.

Before arriving at GTU, John was professor and librarian at Garrett Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois (1964–1977). He served as president of Atla from 1973 to 1974.

He is remembered foremost as a wonderful pastor and an administrator who would join in and get his hands dirty,

At the GTU, he had his hands full. He continued the integration of the libraries of the member schools into a single library (finished in 2005). Holdouts from the initial library integration—Pacific School of Religion and Starr King—were brought into the collection in the new building. Additional full-time staff was hired to meet the challenges of the new building. The library automation process improved. Collection development and other library policies and procedures were reviewed and updated to meet expanding academic and service demands. Working with Claude Welch, John established the GTU Archives and hired Lucinda Glenn as first archivist.

Born in Greenville, Kentucky, he received a BA from Lambuth College, 1955; BD, Vanderbilt Divinity School, 1959; MA, Vanderbilt University, 1962; and MLS, Peabody Library School, 1963. Ordained

to Methodist ministry in 1959, he served as a student pastor in the Memphis Annual Conference.

After retirement, he served on the General Board of the United Methodist Commission on Archives and History (1997–2001) and moved to the Boulder, Colorado area. There he enjoyed nature photography and spending time in the mountains. Always a person for others, he became a spiritual mentor to many and volunteered as a hospice chaplain.

John is survived by his wife of 38 years, Patricia Ann, four children, and an extended family. A memorial service took place on Thursday, December 6, 2018 at First Evangelical Lutheran Church in Longmont. John's final resting place is the columbarium at the foot of the mountain that he loved.

Those who knew him respected him and remember him.

Don Haymes (1940–2019)

Born in Chicago, Don Haymes completed his undergraduate degree at Rhodes College. He later earned a Master of Library Science degree at the University of Tennessee and a Master of Theological Studies degree at Harvard University. He was a distinguished leader in theological librarianship and publishing, pursuing his passions as Editor-in-Chief at Mercer University Press, Director of Index Programs at Atla, and archivist at Christian Theological Seminary.

Don was a lifelong leader in the Churches of Christ, serving as a pastor of congregations and in social justice ministries. He was especially passionate about racial justice and the alleviation of poverty. As a scholar, he belonged to many professional organizations and published more than a dozen articles. Many in the

Churches of Christ and related groups benefitted from his capacious wisdom and expertise. His grateful colleagues honored him with a festschrift entitled, *Restoring the First-Century Church in the Twenty-First Century* (Wipf and Stock, 2005).

Don was a lover of vintage automobiles and could “recite their details in a way that only connoisseurs and mechanics could understand.” A member of several automobile clubs, he especially enjoyed driving his own Studebaker truck.

Don is survived by his wife, Betty (Hollis) Haymes, a son, Malcolm Haymes, and loving members of his extended family.

Page Allison Thomas (1936–2019)

Page Allison Thomas was born July 2, 1936 in Leslie, Arkansas, where he was raised. Page was licensed to preach in 1956 at the Leslie Methodist Church. He received a BA from Hendrix College in 1958 and moved to Dallas to attend Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University where he earned his BD in 1961. He preached at Bethel Methodist Church in Greenville, Texas from 1963 to 1965.

Page began working at Bridwell Library in September 1961, following his graduation from Perkins. His one-year contract turned into 46 years, giving him the longest single appointment in the United Methodist Church. He worked his way through every department in the library, culminating in his true research love as the director of the Center for Methodist Studies. His love of rare books led him on many adventures, including several trips to England. On one of these trips, he followed John Wesley’s ministry route. Page kept all the various evolutions of the Methodist Church structure in the United States firmly in his grasp and could aid any researcher with the ins and outs of the conferences, general conferences, and doctrines, down

to the last detail.

Page was mentored by Kate Warnick, SMU's first theological librarian, and worked for five directors: Decherd Turner, Jerry Campbell, Robert Maloy, Valerie Hotchkiss, and Roberta Schaafsma. He retired in 2007.

In his free time, Page enjoyed eating ice cream, blacksmithing, fishing, raising horses, and sharing these loves with his grandchildren. He reeled in his last fish on Shadow Lake in Arkansas in the summer of 2018 and passed away peacefully on Friday, March 8, 2019 in McKinney, Texas.

AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS OF AMERICAN THEOLOGICAL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

(An Illinois Not-For-Profit Corporation)

AS ADOPTED JUNE 15, 2018

ARTICLE I

OFFICES

SECTION 1.01 Principal and Other Offices. The principal office of the Corporation shall be located in the State of Illinois. The Corporation may have such other offices, either within or without the State of Illinois, as the Board of Directors may determine or as the affairs of the Corporation may require from time to time.

SECTION 1.02 Registered Agent and Office. The Corporation shall have and continuously maintain in the State of Illinois a registered office and a registered agent whose office is identical with such registered office, as required by the Not for Profit Corporation Act. The registered office may be, but need not be, identical with the principal office in the State of Illinois. The registered agent of the Corporation may be changed from time to time by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERS

SECTION 2.01 Classes of Membership. The Corporation shall have six (6) classes of membership: Institutional, Individual, Affiliate, Student, Retired, and Emeritus. Institutional Members, Individual Members, and Retired Members are voting members (collectively, the "Voting Members"). Affiliate Members, Student Members, and Emeritus Members are non-voting members (collectively, the "Non-Voting Members").

SECTION 2.02 Rights of Membership.

- (a) Voting Members. Voting Members shall have only the following rights: (1) attend meetings of the members and vote; (2) elect Directors to serve on the Board of Directors; (3) approve any alteration of, amendment to, or repeal of the Bylaws; (4) participate in such Corporation programs as the Board of

Directors may determine from time to time; and (5) receive those publications of the Corporation that are distributed to the membership. Voting Members shall not have any rights other than those stated in this Section 2.02(a).

- (a) Non-Voting Members. Non-Voting Members shall not have the right to vote on any matters. Non-Voting Members shall have the right to (1) attend meetings of the members; (2) receive those publications of the Corporation that are distributed to the membership; and (3) participate in such other Corporation programs as the Board of Directors may determine from time to time.
- (b) Corporation Programs. With respect to Corporation programs, the Board of Directors may establish different programs for each membership class and may limit participation in any such program to members of the pertinent membership class.

SECTION 2.03 Qualifications for Membership. The Board of Directors may establish qualifications for membership from time to time. As of the date of these Bylaws, the qualifications for membership are as follows:

- (a) Institutional Members. A library of an institution qualifies for Institutional Membership if the institution is (1) an institution of higher education supporting programs in theology or religious studies that is accredited by an authority recognized by the U.S. Department of Education, Council of Higher Education Accreditation, or the equivalent thereof in other jurisdictions, or (2) a non-degree granting organization maintaining one or more significant collections primarily of theological, religious, or ecclesiastical research material. If the applicant library serves more than one institution, at least one of the institutions shall meet one of the qualifications set forth in this Section 2.03(a).
- (b) Individual Members. Any person who is engaged in professional library or scholarly communications work in theological or religious fields or who has a demonstrated, bona fide interest in the literature of religion, theological librarianship, or the purposes and work of the Corporation, shall qualify for Individual Membership in the Corporation.
- (c) Affiliate Members. An organization that does not qualify for Institutional Membership, but that has a demonstrated record of support for theological librarianship and the purposes and work of the Corporation, shall qualify for Affiliate Membership.
- (d) Student Members. Any student enrolled in a degree program who is carrying a half-time course load or greater shall qualify for Student Membership.
- (e) Retired Members. To qualify for Retired Membership in the Corporation, a person must (1) have fully retired from gainful employment; and (2) have been an Individual Member continuously for the immediately preceding ten-year period.
- (f) Emeritus Members. To qualify for Emeritus Membership, a person must have been an Individual Member or Retired Member continuously for the immediately preceding ten-year period. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing, each member must be in good standing with respect to any dues owed to the Corporation and must be supportive of the purposes and work of the Corporation.
- (g) Upon receipt of an application for membership, person(s) authorized by the Board of Directors shall review the application and the applicant's credentials to determine if the applicant does in fact meet the requirements for member-

ship. This determination must be made in good faith and, once so made, is final and not appealable.

SECTION 2.04 Dues of Members. The Board of Directors shall determine from time to time the amount, if any, of membership dues associated with each class of membership. Membership dues, if any, shall be payable in advance for the following full year. Memberships will automatically be renewed upon payment of the annual membership dues, if any, for the next succeeding year.

SECTION 2.05 Transfer of Membership. Membership in the Corporation is not transferable or assignable by any member.

SECTION 2.06 Suspension. Members failing to pay their annual membership dues within sixty (60) calendar days of their due date shall automatically be suspended and shall lose all rights, including, but not limited to, any voting rights. A member thus suspended may be reinstated by payment of such member's unpaid dues. Members also may be suspended or reinstated by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors then in office.

SECTION 2.07 Resignation. Any Member may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, the President, or the Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect when the notice is delivered, unless the notice specifies a future date. Unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

SECTION 2.08 Termination of Membership. The Board of Directors may terminate a membership by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors then in office.

ARTICLE III

MEETING OF MEMBERS

SECTION 3.01 Annual Member Meetings. Regular annual meetings of the members (each, an "Annual Member Meeting") shall be held at such time and place as shall be fixed by the Board of Directors, for the purpose of electing Directors and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of additional regular meetings of the members (each, a "Regular Member Meeting"). If the election of Directors shall not be held at the Annual Member Meeting, the Voting Members shall cause the election to be held at a Regular Member Meeting or at a special meeting of the members (each, a "Special Member Meeting") as soon thereafter as may be convenient.

SECTION 3.02 Special Member Meetings. Special Member Meetings may be called at any time by the Board of Directors, the President, or the Secretary, and shall be called by the Secretary upon written request (stating the purpose of the proposed meeting) signed by at least fifteen percent (15%) of the Voting Members or by one-third (1/3) of the Directors then in office. Special Member Meetings shall be held at such place as may be designated in the notice or waiver of notice of such meeting.

SECTION 3.03 Notice and Waiver of Notice.

- (a) Unless otherwise provided by Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, notice of Annual, Regular, and Special Member Meetings shall be delivered to each Voting Member not less than five (5) days nor more than sixty (60) days before the date of such meeting at such Voting Member's address as it appears on the records of the Corporation. Such notice shall state the place, date, hour, and, in the case of a Special Member Meeting, the purpose(s) of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the U.S. mail in a sealed envelope so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice is sent by facsimile transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered upon direction to the facsimile number of record of the Voting Member. If notice is given by electronic mail or other means of electronic transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered upon direction to the electronic mail address or other electronic address of record of the Voting Member. If sent by any other means (including telegram, cablegram, courier, or express mail), such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when actually delivered to the home or business address of the Voting Member. The Corporation may, but is not required to, provide notice of any meetings to the Non-Voting Members.
- (b) When any notice whatever is required to be given under the provisions of the Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice. The attendance of a Voting Member at a meeting of the members shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where the Voting Member objects to the holding of the meeting because proper notice was not given.

SECTION 3.04 Proxies. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

SECTION 3.05 Designated Representative. Each Institutional Member and Affiliate Member shall designate in writing an individual who has the right to act on its behalf (each, a "Designated Representative"), and the Corporation shall have the right to rely on this designation and any acts, omissions, or representations of the Designated Representative unless and until the member designates someone else to serve as the Designated Representative. The Designated Representative must be an employee or officer of the respective Institutional Member or Affiliate Member.

SECTION 3.06 Quorum. Fifteen percent (15%) of each of the classes of Voting Members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the members. For the purposes of a quorum, the classes of Individual and Retired Members shall be counted as one class.

SECTION 3.07 Voting. Each Voting Member shall be entitled to one (1) vote on each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. For purposes of clarification, an individual who is both an Individual or Retired Member and a Designated Representative of an Institutional Member may cast a total of two (2) votes on each matter submitted to a vote of the members, one (1) such vote in his or her capacity as an Individual or Retired Member and one (1) such vote in his or her capacity as a Designated Representative.

SECTION 3.08 Use of Conference Telephone or Other Interactive Technology. If the Board of Directors so determines, Members may participate in and, in the case of Voting Members, act at any meeting of the members by means of a conference telephone or other similar interactive technology, including, but not limited to, electronic transmission, Internet usage, or remote communication, so long as all persons participating in the meeting can communicate with each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

SECTION 3.09 Informal Action by Members.

- (a) Action by Ballot. Any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the members may be taken without a meeting by ballot in writing by mail, e-mail, or other electronic means, pursuant to which the Voting Members are given the opportunity to vote for or against the proposed action, provided that the number of Voting Members casting a vote satisfies the quorum requirements set forth in Section 3.06 hereof and the action receives approval by a majority of the Voting Members casting votes or such larger number as may be required by the Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws. Voting must remain open for not less than five (5) days from the date the ballot is delivered; provided, however, in the case of a removal of one or more Directors, a merger, consolidation, dissolution, or a sale, lease, or exchange of assets, the voting must remain open for not less than twenty (20) days from the date the ballot is delivered. The action shall become effective only if, at least five (5) days prior to the effective date of such action, a notice in writing of the proposed action is delivered to all of the Voting Members.
- (b) Action by Written Consent. Any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the members may be taken without a meeting and without a vote if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the Voting Members.
- (c) Use of Electronic Signature. A Voting Member may take action by a written consent using an electronic signature if the electronic transmission approving the action includes the signatory's full name in a form intended by the signatory: (a) to serve as his or her signature and (b) to authenticate the consent. Each electronic signature should be affixed to an email message or other electronic communication that: (i) contains, attaches, or references the written consent action; (ii) includes an affirmative statement (such as "Yes," "I agree," or "I consent"); and (iii) contains a clear reference to the written consent action in the subject line.

ARTICLE IV

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 4.01 General Powers of Directors. The property and affairs of the Corporation shall be managed by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 4.02 Number, Tenure, and Qualifications of Directors.

- (a) The Board of Directors shall consist of twelve (12) Directors to be divided into three (3) classes—Class A, Class B, and Class C—such that there shall be four (4) Directors in each class.

- (b) The Voting Members shall elect Directors to succeed those Directors whose terms expire, and such elections shall be for three-year terms of office, each to expire at the third succeeding Annual Member Meeting after the Director's election. No Director shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms, except that a Director appointed to fill an unexpired term of eighteen (18) months or less may be elected to two (2) consecutive full terms thereafter. A Director shall hold office until his or her successor shall have been duly elected and qualified or until the Director's death, resignation, or removal.
- (c) The Board of Directors shall establish an annual calendar, timeline, and procedure for the nomination of candidates for election as Directors, each of which shall not be inconsistent with these Bylaws.
- (d) The Nominating Committee shall develop a slate of at least two (2) nominations for each of the four (4) directorships to be filled at each Annual Member Meeting and shall deliver the slate to the Board of Directors and the Secretary. The Board of Directors may modify the Nominating Committee's slate before delivering the initial slate to the Voting Members.
- (e) The Voting Members may add candidate(s) to the slate by petition(s) signed by at least ten (10) Voting Members and filed with the Secretary. The Secretary shall deliver to the Voting Members (i) the final slate of candidates, including biographical data on each candidate, and (ii) a ballot. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing, no candidate may be included on this final slate without his or her consent.
- (f) Each Director must be an Individual or Retired Member in good standing at the time of his or her nomination and election and throughout the entirety of his or her service on the Board of Directors. A Director shall automatically cease to be a Director immediately upon ceasing to be an Individual or Retired Member in good standing. No employee of the Corporation may be a Director.

SECTION 4.03 Annual and Regular Director Meetings. Annual meetings of the Board of Directors (each, an "Annual Director Meeting") shall be held at such time and place as may be fixed by the Board of Directors for the purpose of electing Officers and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of additional regular meetings of the Board of Directors (each, a "Regular Director Meeting") without other notice than such resolution. If the election of Officers shall not be held at any Annual Director Meeting, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a Regular Director Meeting or at a special meeting of the Board of Directors (each, a "Special Director Meeting") as soon thereafter as may be convenient.

SECTION 4.04 Special Director Meetings. Special Director Meetings may be called by or at the request of the President or any three (3) Directors, and such person or persons may fix any place as the location of any Special Director Meeting so called. For purposes of clarification, no business may be transacted at any such meeting unless a quorum of Directors is present, as set forth in Section 4.07 of these Bylaws.

SECTION 4.05 Member Access to Meetings. Meetings of the Board of Directors are open to members of the Corporation with the exception of portions thereof that are executive sessions as specifically designated by the Board of Directors or as called by any Director. Members who wish to attend a meeting of the Board of Directors shall inform the President at least two (2) days in advance to assure that adequate space is available.

SECTION 4.06 Notice and Waiver of Notice.

- (a) Unless otherwise required by the Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, written notice of any Annual or Special Director Meeting shall be delivered not less than three (3) days before the date of such meeting to each Director at his or her address as it appears on the records of the Corporation, and such notice shall state the place, date, hour, and, in the case of a Special Director Meeting, the purpose(s) of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the U.S. Mail in a sealed envelope so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice is sent by facsimile transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered upon direction to the facsimile number of record of the Director. If notice is given by electronic mail or other means of electronic transmission, such notice shall be deemed to be given upon direction to the electronic mail address or other electronic address of record of the Director. If sent by any other means (including telegram, cablegram, courier, or express mail), such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when actually delivered to the home or business address of the Director.
- (b) When any notice whatever is required to be given under the provisions of the Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice. The attendance of a Director at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Director attends the meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

SECTION 4.07 Quorum. A majority of the Directors then in office shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 4.08 Use of Conference Telephone or Other Interactive Technology. If the Board of Directors so determines, members of the Board of Directors or any committee may participate in and act at any meeting of the Board of Directors or committee, as the case may be, by means of a conference telephone or other similar interactive technology, including, but not limited to, electronic transmission, Internet usage, or remote communication, so long as all persons participating in the meeting can communicate with each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

SECTION 4.09 Manner of Acting. The act of a majority of the Directors present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, unless the act of a greater number is required by the Not for Profit Corporation Act, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws.

SECTION 4.10 Informal Action by Directors.

- (a) Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors or any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing setting forth the action so taken shall be signed by all of the Directors or by all of the members of such committee, as the case may be, and the writing or writings are filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors or committee. Any such consent signed by all the Directors or all committee members, as the case may be, shall have the same effect as a unanimous vote and may be stated as such in any document filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Illinois under the Not for Profit Corporation Act.
- (b) A Director or committee member, as the case may be, may take action by a written consent using an electronic signature if the electronic transmission approving the action includes the signatory's full name in a form intended by the signatory (a) to serve as his or her signature and (b) to authenticate the consent. Each electronic signature should be affixed to an e-mail message or other electronic communication that (i) contains, attaches, or references the written consent action; (ii) includes an affirmative statement (such as "Yes," "I agree," or "I consent"); and (iii) contains a clear reference to the written consent action in the subject line.

SECTION 4.11 Resignation. Any Director may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, the President, or the Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect when the notice is delivered unless the notice specifies a future date. Unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

SECTION 4.12 Removal.

- (a) Removal by Voting Members. Any Director may be removed, with or without cause, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Voting Members present and voting at any Annual, Regular, or Special Member Meeting at which a quorum is present. The proposed removal shall be set forth in the notice of any such meeting, and the notice shall be delivered to each Voting Member at least twenty (20) days and not more than sixty (60) days prior to such meeting.
- (b) Removal by the Board of Directors. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any Director appointed by the Board of Directors pursuant to Section 4.13 hereof may be removed, with or without cause, by the affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors then in office at any meeting of the Board of Directors at which a quorum is present whenever, in their judgment, the best interests of the Corporation would be served thereby. The proposed removal shall be set forth in the notice of any Special Director Meeting, delivered to each Director at least twenty (20) days prior to such meeting.
- (c) Automatic Removal. Notwithstanding each of Sections 4.12(a) and 4.12(b) of these Bylaws, any Director who fails to attend any two (2) meetings of the Board of Directors in any given year, without reasonable excuse therefor, as determined in the sole reasonable discretion of the Board of Directors, shall automatically be removed from the Board of Directors, such that a vote of the Voting Members or the Board of Directors shall not be required to effectuate such removal. For purposes

of clarification, attendance includes participation by means of conference telephone or other interactive technology in accordance with Section 4.08 hereof.

SECTION 4.13 Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or otherwise may be filled by the Board of Directors at any meeting thereof, provided that the individual appointed to fill the vacancy shall be an Individual or Retired Member in good standing. A Director elected or appointed to fill a vacancy shall serve for the unexpired term of his or her predecessor in office.

SECTION 4.14 Recognition of Outstanding Contributions. The Board of Directors may in its discretion confer an award or other honor, exclusive of membership, in recognition of any person who has made an outstanding contribution to the advancement of the Corporation's work, provided that such award or other honor and the procedures in connection therewith are consistent with Section 501(c)(3) of the Code and any applicable section of Chapter 42 of the Code.

SECTION 4.15 Compensation. Directors shall not receive compensation for their services as Directors; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the Corporation in any other capacity and receiving reasonable compensation for personal services rendered to the Corporation that are reasonable and necessary to carry out one or more of the taxexempt purposes of the Corporation, so long as the Director complies with the conflict of interest procedures of Article XI hereof and any other policies adopted by the Board of Directors. Directors may receive reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred in connection with corporate matters, provided that such reimbursement is authorized by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

SECTION 5.01 Officers. The Board of Directors shall elect a President, a Vice President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary of the Corporation (each, an "Officer" and, taken together with all other officers of the Corporation elected by the Board of Directors, the "Officers"). The Board of Directors also may appoint an Executive Director and elect one or more Assistant Secretaries and Assistant Treasurers and such additional Officers as the Board of Directors may deem necessary or appropriate from time to time. In extraordinary circumstances, any two (2) or more offices may be held by the same person. The Officers elected by the Board of Directors shall have such duties as are hereafter described and such additional duties as the Board of Directors may from time to time prescribe. Each Officer, other than the Executive Director, must be elected from among the Directors. An individual's resignation or removal as a Director shall be deemed to also be a resignation or removal from any Officer position held by that individual.

SECTION 5.02 Election and Term of Office. With the exception of the Executive Director, the Officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors at the Annual Director Meeting. If the election of Officers is not held at such meeting,

such election shall be held as soon thereafter as may be convenient. New offices of the Corporation may be created and filled, and vacancies in offices may be filled, at any meeting of the Board of Directors. Each Officer shall hold office until the Officer's successor has been duly elected and qualified or until the Officer's death, resignation, or removal. Election or appointment of an Officer shall not of itself create contract rights.

SECTION 5.03 Resignation. Any Officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, the President, or the Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect when the notice is delivered unless the notice specifies a future date. Unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

SECTION 5.04 Removal. Any Officer elected or appointed by the Board of Directors may be removed, with or without cause, by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of all Directors then in office whenever, in their judgment, the best interests of the Corporation would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the person or persons so removed.

SECTION 5.05 Vacancies. A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or otherwise may be filled by the Board of Directors at any meeting thereof. An Officer elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected to serve until the next Annual Director Meeting.

SECTION 5.06 President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Corporation and Board of Directors and shall see that the orders and resolutions of the Board of Directors are carried into effect, except in those instances in which that responsibility is assigned to some other person by the Board of Directors. The President may sign bonds, mortgages, and all other contracts and documents, whether or not under the seal, if any, of the Corporation, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by law, by the Board of Directors, or by these Bylaws to some other Officer or agent of the Corporation.

SECTION 5.07 Vice President. The Vice President shall perform such duties as shall be assigned to the Vice President by the President or the Board of Directors. In the absence of the President or in the event of the President's inability or refusal to act, the Vice President shall perform the duties of the President and, when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions of the President.

SECTION 5.08 Secretary. The Secretary shall perform or direct and supervise the performance of the following: (a) attend all meetings of the Board of Directors and record all the proceedings of the meetings and actions of the Board of Directors in one or more files provided for that purpose; (b) be the custodian of the corporate records and of the seal, if any, of the Corporation; (c) keep a register of the post office address and electronic mail address of each Director, which shall be furnished to the Secretary by such Director; (d) see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these Bylaws or as

required by law; and (e) in general perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to the Secretary by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5.09 Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the principal financial officer of the Corporation. The Treasurer shall perform or direct and supervise the performance of the following: (a) have charge of and be responsible for overseeing the maintenance of adequate books of account for the Corporation; (b) have charge of all funds and securities of the Corporation and be responsible for overseeing the management, receipt, and disbursement thereof; and (c) in general perform all the duties incident to the office of Treasurer and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to the Treasurer by the Board of Directors. If required by the Board of Directors, the Treasurer shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of the Treasurer's duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as the Board of Directors shall determine. The Treasurer shall serve as the Chair of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 5.10 Executive Director. From time to time, the Corporation may appoint an Executive Director who shall be an employee of the Corporation and shall be a non-voting member of the Board of Directors. The Executive Director shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation and, as such, shall meet regularly with the Board of Directors and in general supervise and control all the business and affairs of the Corporation, unless otherwise provided by the Board of Directors. The Executive Director may discuss corporate matters with the Board of Directors but shall not be entitled to vote on any matter submitted to a vote of the Board of Directors. The Executive Director shall, ex officio, be an assistant secretary of the Corporation, empowered to certify to corporate actions in the absence of the Secretary. The Executive Director, in addition to appointing and overseeing staff, shall be responsible to the Board of Directors for the administration of programs, services, and other activities of the Corporation; shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board of Directors are carried into effect; and shall appoint members of advisory committees, representatives to other organizations, and other officials and agents of the Corporation, and oversee their work.

SECTION 5.11 Assistant Treasurers and Assistant Secretaries. Any Assistant Treasurers and Assistant Secretaries shall perform such duties as shall be assigned to them by the Treasurer or the Secretary, respectively, or by the Board of Directors. If required by the Board of Directors, the Assistant Treasurers shall give bonds for the faithful discharge of their duties in such sums and with such sureties as the Board of Directors shall determine.

SECTION 5.12 Other Officers and Agents. Any Officer not otherwise specified in these Bylaws shall have such authority and perform such duties as may from time to time be prescribed by resolution of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5.13 Absence of Officers. In the absence of any Officer, or for any other reason the Board of Directors may deem sufficient, the Board of Directors may delegate the powers or duties, or any such powers or duties, of any Officer to any other Officer or to any Director.

SECTION 5.14 Compensation. Unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors or otherwise provided herein, the Officers shall not receive compensation for their services as Officers; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Officer from serving the Corporation in any other capacity and receiving reasonable compensation for personal services rendered to the Corporation that are reasonable and necessary to carry out one or more of the tax- exempt purposes of the Corporation, so long as the Officers comply with any policies adopted by the Board of Directors. Officers may receive reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred in connection with corporate matters, provided that such reimbursement is authorized by the Board of Directors. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing, the individual serving as Executive Director may receive reasonable compensation for such service, as determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE VI

COMMITTEES

SECTION 6.01 Board Committees. The Board of Directors may, by resolution adopted by a majority of the Directors in office, designate one or more committees, each committee to consist of two (2) or more Directors and a majority of each committee's membership to be Directors; provided, however, that committees appointed by the Board of Directors or otherwise authorized pursuant to these Bylaws relating to the election, nomination, qualification, or credentials of the Directors or other committees involved in the process of electing Directors may be composed entirely of non-Directors. Any committee, to the extent provided in the resolution of the Board of Directors and allowed by law, shall have and may exercise all the powers and authority of the Board of Directors in the management of the business and affairs of the Corporation; provided, however, that no such committee shall have the power or authority of the Board of Directors in reference to (a) amending or repealing these Bylaws or the Articles of Incorporation; (b) electing, appointing, or removing any Officer, Director, or committee member, or fixing the compensation of any committee member; (c) adopting a plan of merger or adopting a plan of consolidation with another corporation; (d) authorizing the sale, lease, exchange, or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property or assets of the Corporation; (e) filling vacancies on the Board of Directors or any of its committees; (f) adopting a plan for the distribution of the assets of the Corporation or for dissolution; or (g) amending, altering, repealing, or taking any action inconsistent with any resolution or action of the Board of Directors which by its terms provides that it shall not be amended, altered, or repealed by any such committee.

SECTION 6.02 Advisory Committees. By resolution, the Board of Directors may designate one or more advisory committees not having and exercising the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of the Corporation. Members of any such advisory committee may, but need not, be Directors, and the Board of Directors shall appoint the members thereof, except as and to the extent such authority shall be vested in an Officer or agent of the Corporation by the Board of Directors or these Bylaws.

SECTION 6.03 Nominating Committee. There shall be a committee of the Board of Directors, which shall identify and nominate individuals to serve on the Board of Directors of the Corporation (the "Nominating Committee"). The Nominating Committee shall present its nominations to the Board of Directors and the Secretary. The Nominating Committee shall consist of two (2) Individual or Retired Members and one (1) Director who is not then up for re-election to the Board of Directors, each of whom shall be appointed by the Board of Directors (collectively, the "Nominating Committee Members"). The Nominating Committee Members shall be divided into three classes, as nearly equal in number as reasonably possible, as shall be designated by resolution of the Board of Directors. The terms of each class of Nominating Committee Members shall be staggered such that only one class shall be appointed each year. Each Nominating Committee Member shall serve for a nonrenewable term of three (3) years or until his or her successor has been duly elected and qualified. The longest serving member of the Nominating Committee shall serve as the chair thereof.

SECTION 6.04 Finance Committee. There shall be a Finance Committee, which shall have the responsibility of supervising the financial affairs of the Corporation and shall have and may exercise the powers and authority of the Board of Directors to the extent permitted by law, the Articles of Incorporation, and these Bylaws. The Finance Committee shall be comprised of at least two (2) Directors who shall be appointed by the Board of Directors, and a majority of its members shall be Directors. The Treasurer shall be the chair of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6.05 Term of Office. Each member of a committee established pursuant to this Article VI, other than the Nominating Committee Members, shall serve as such until the next Annual Director Meeting and until such committee member's successor is appointed, unless the committee shall be sooner terminated by resolution of the Board of Directors, or unless such committee member resigns or is removed from such committee. Any committee member may be removed, with or without cause, by the Board of Directors whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Corporation shall be served thereby.

SECTION 6.06 Chair. Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, one (1) member of each committee shall be appointed as chair by the person or persons authorized to appoint committee members thereof.

SECTION 6.07 Vacancies. Vacancies in the membership of any committee may be filled by appointments made in the same manner as provided for in the original appointments.

SECTION 6.08 Quorum. Unless otherwise provided in the resolution of the Board of Directors designating a committee, a majority of the committee members shall constitute a quorum and the act of a majority of the committee members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the committee.

SECTION 6.09 Rules. Each committee shall fix its own rules governing the conduct of its activities, not inconsistent with these Bylaws or the rules promulgated by the Board of Directors, and shall furnish to the Board of Directors such reports of its activities as the Board of Directors may request.

ARTICLE VII

CONTRACTS, CHECKS, DEPOSITS, GIFTS AND INVESTMENTS

SECTION 7.01 Contracts. The Board of Directors may authorize any Officer or Officers or agent or agents of the Corporation, in addition to the Officers so authorized by these Bylaws, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Corporation, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

SECTION 7.02 Checks, Drafts, Etc. All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidence of indebtedness issued in the name of the Corporation shall be signed by such Officer or Officers or agent or agents of the Corporation and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 7.03 Deposits. All funds of the Corporation shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Corporation in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Directors may designate by resolution.

SECTION 7.04 Gifts. The Board of Directors may accept or reject or by resolution may authorize any Officer or Officers or agent or agents of the Corporation to accept or reject, on behalf of the Corporation, any contribution, gift, bequest, or devise for the general purposes or for any special purpose of the Corporation.

SECTION 7.05 Investments. The Board of Directors shall manage, invest, operate, deal in and with, and conserve the property of the Corporation, and may retain any or all of the assets transferred to the Corporation by gift or bequest; provided, however, that the exercise of any of such powers shall not in any way conflict with the purposes of the Corporation as stated in its Articles of Incorporation, and such powers shall not be exercised so as to cause the Corporation to lose its qualification as an organization exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code. The Board of Directors may delegate investment management duties to an officer, employee, or independent investment firm, provided that doing so is prudent and in the best interests of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VIII

BOOKS AND RECORDS

The Corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account and shall also keep minutes of the proceedings of its Board of Directors and each committee thereof.

ARTICLE IX

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Corporation shall end on August 31st of each year.

ARTICLE X

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

SECTION 10.01 Indemnification. The Corporation shall indemnify each person who is or was a Director or Officer, or who is serving or has served at the request of the Corporation as a director, trustee, or officer of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, and may indemnify any person who is or was an employee or agent of the Corporation and any person who is serving or has served at its request as an employee or agent of any other enterprise, to the fullest extent from time to time permitted by the laws of the State of Illinois and by Section 4941 or 4958 of the Code, as applicable, in the event any of such persons was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party, to any threatened, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative.

SECTION 10.02 Authorization of Indemnification. Any indemnification under this Article X (unless the indemnification is ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation only as authorized in the specific case, upon a determination that indemnification of the Director, Officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation is proper in the circumstances. In the case of indemnification that is mandatory under Section 10.01 hereof, the determination shall be limited to (a) whether the person to be indemnified has met the standards specified in Section 10.01 and (b) the amount of the indemnification permitted by law. Any determination under this Section 10.02 shall be made (a) by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Directors who were not parties to such action, suit, or proceeding or (b) if such a quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested Directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion.

SECTION 10.03 Advance Payments. Expenses incurred in defending a civil or criminal action, suit, or proceeding may be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit, or proceeding, as authorized by the Board of Directors in the specific case, upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the Director, Officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation to repay such amount, unless it shall ultimately be determined that he or she is entitled to be indemnified by the Corporation as authorized in this Article X, unless such payment would constitute an act of self-dealing under Section 4941 of the Code if the Corporation is a private foundation or an excess benefit transaction under Section 4958 of the Code if the Corporation is a public charity.

SECTION 10.04 Non-Exclusivity and Continuation. The indemnification provided by this Article X shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which a person seeking indemnification may be entitled under any agreement, vote of disinterested Directors, or otherwise, both as to action in the

person's official capacity and as to action in another capacity while holding such office, and shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a Director, Officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation, and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, and administrators of such a person.

SECTION 10.05 Insurance. The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance (a) to insure itself with respect to the indemnification payments it is authorized or obligated to make pursuant to this Article X and (b) on behalf of any person who is or was a Director, Officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation, or who is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, trustee, officer, employee, or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, to insure against any liability asserted against such person and incurred by him or her in any such capacity, or arising out of his or her status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify the person against such liability under the provisions of this Article X.

ARTICLE XI

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

SECTION 11.01 Conflict of Interest. A Director shall disclose to the Board of Directors any material interest which such Director directly or indirectly has in any person or entity which is a party to a transaction under consideration by the Board of Directors, or which to the Director's knowledge might otherwise cause a conflict with a fiduciary duty owed by the Director to the Corporation. Such interested Director shall abstain from voting on such transaction or other action, but such interested Director's presence may be counted in determining whether a quorum is present.

SECTION 11.02 Material Interest. A Director shall be considered to have a material interest in an entity if the Director is a director, officer, or employee of the entity or if the Director has a material financial interest in the entity.

SECTION 11.03 Comprehensive Policy. The Board of Directors shall have the power and authority to adopt a more comprehensive policy regarding conflicts of interest, which may supplement this Article XI, as so directed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XII

AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed and new Bylaws adopted by the Voting Members. Such action may be, but shall not be required to be, taken at any meeting of the Voting Members, provided that no such alteration, amendment, repeal, or adoption shall in any way conflict with the purposes of the Corporation as stated in its Articles of Incorporation or otherwise cause the Corporation to lose its qualification as an organization exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code. Written notice of any proposed alteration, amendment, repeal, or adoption of the Bylaws shall be

delivered to each Voting Member not less than twenty (20) days before the date of the vote on such matter at such Voting Member's address as it appears on the records of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XIII

MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 13.01 Definitions. In addition to the terms defined elsewhere in these Bylaws, the following terms shall have the following meanings when used herein:

- (a) "Articles of Incorporation" means the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Illinois on July 31, 1992, and any amendments thereto.
- (b) "Section of the Code" means a section of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and shall include corresponding provisions of future federal tax laws, all as from time to time in effect.
- (c) "Director" means a voting member of the Board of Directors.
- (d) "Not for Profit Corporation Act" means the Illinois General Not for Profit Corporation Act of 1986, as amended.

SECTION 13.02 Writings. Any action required in these Bylaws to be "written," to be "in writing," to have "written consent," to have "written approval," and the like by or of Directors or committee members shall include any communication transmitted or received by facsimile, electronic mail, or other means of electronic transmission.

2018 ATS LIBRARY STATISTICS






1. Which of the following most accurately describes your institution's library?



2. Is your library the primary source of support on your campus for:





Of the 58 libraries who responded in the affirmative, it was reported that an average of 15.16% of the total library collection was stored offsite, with the average number of volumes being 109,518. Among the other items stored offsite were audio visual materials, archival materials, bound periodicals, monographs, and unprocessed materials. Some also reported that offsite storage could refer to another building on campus.
